There she raised a family of 7 boys and 2 girls. and where she herself quietly and peacefully breathed her last. The first sorrow to the family came when her husband died on March 12th 1871 aged 46 years and 10 months. Then her second eldest son, John, died on June the 5th 1874 aged 18 year and 8 months and her yougest son David at Georgtown on Sept. 11th 1900.
