Wm. Thomson, Esq., of Orillia, Vice-President Standard Chemical Company of Toronto, Tells of a Visit to the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives.

#### GREATLY IMPRESSED WITH WORK BEING DONE.

Personally Raises Several Hundred Dollars to Help Lessen the Load of Debt.

There can be little doubt that the National Sanitarium Association is handicapped in its great work for Consumptives in the fact that its two institutions in Muskoka are far away from any large centre of population. Few people have an opportunity to see for themselves the magnificent work that is being done.

These hospitals are away from the public eye. Any, however, who do visit them, are united in their commendation of the splendid appointments of the place, and, best of all, of the real joy and hope that is being brought to many suffering ones.

"Last week I paid a visit to the Free Hospital for Consumptives at Gravenhurst. I met some of the management there, and promised to try and interest some of my friends in this work.

"I might say there were 49 patients there last week, all poor people, most of them without a dollar in the world, and suffering from the dreadful disease, Consumption. There are many sad stories, and I know I have thought a great deal about the work of the institution ever since my visit there. I do believe it is worthy of assistance, and we who have health and the necessities of life should encourage this work along.

"I understand the expenses lately have been double the income, and unless the management meet with more encouragement, I am afraid the work will have to be curtailed. I know you have many calls, but I do wish you would give this matter a thought, and, if possible, assist. 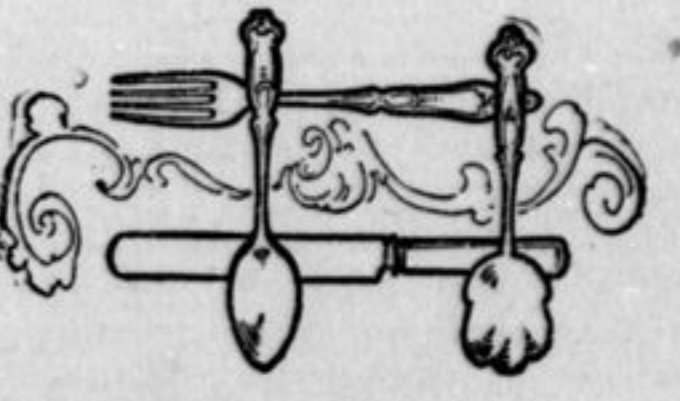
