A TRANSPORTATION PROBLEM.

(Monetary Times)

Sir Thomas Seaghnessy, in his interesting address to the Canadian Club in Toronto, on Monday, made some remarks on one aspect of the transportation question which, it seems to us, require a little modification. Speaking of the frequent complaints made by the public as to poor railroad service, inefficiency of rolling stock, and so forth, he stated what of course no one will dispute, that in order to make due preparation for a time of great prosperity and growth of traffic, immense sums of money have to be provided, and that if in the meantime the expected development of trade does not take place, a setback is delivered to the finances of the company and incidentally to the credit of the country. This of course is true, and points out the natural disinclination of a transportation company to go too far ahead of actual necessities. Conservatism is well, and optimism which is afterwards proved to have been ill-placed is a danger.

But this point is precisely where the call for managerial judgment comes into play. When a railroad or any other company believes that all the signs are in favor of a coming era of great activity, when it prepares for this beforehand, even at an immense outlay, and when in the course of time its belief proves to have been warranted by actual circumstances, the public willingly gives the management credit for great astuteness. Surely, then, the converse applies also. When the era of great prosperity has arrived, and we find that a railway has made insufficient arrangements to take advantage thereof, it is hardly convincing to be told that supposing trade had not developed to such an extent, the company's credit would have suffered. The country at large has only to judge of results in each case. If, on the other hand, the well formed judgment be deemed worthy of praise, then equally so is the judgment which proves ill-founded—conserving of blame.

A BUSINESS MAN'S LETTER.

Wm. Thomson, Esq., of Orillia, Vice-President Standard Chemical Company of Toronto, Tells of a Visit to the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives.

GREATLY IMPRESSED WITH WORK BEING DONE.

Personally Raises Several Hundred Dollars to Help Lessen the Load of Debt.

I have written to a number of my friends, to try and get them interested in this good work. I hope to be able to send you further donations. I have written my friend's a personal letter, something similar to the following:

"Last week I paid a visit to the Free Hospital for Consumptives at Gravenhurst. I met some of the management there, and promised to try and interest some of my friends in this work.

"I might say there were 49 patients there last week, all poor people, most of them without a dollar in the world, and suffering from the dreadful disease, Consumption. There are many sad stories, and I know I have thought a great deal about the work of the institution ever since my visit there. I do believe it is worthy of assistance, and we who have health and the necessities of life should encourage this work along.

"I understand the expenses lately have been double the income, and unless the management meet with more encouragement, I am afraid the work will have to be curtailed. I know you have many calls, but I do wish you would give this matter a thought, and, if possible, assist. I have written to two or three confidentially, and hope to be able to collect some more for this work. Should you not feel like contributing a donation, remember this request, and your reply is just between you and me, and strictly confidential.

"I might mention, to show that I have confidence in the work, I have already given a donation of \$100.00 and two row boats to the Free Hospital this year, and intend to give another \$100.00 before the end of the year."

MOTHER OF FOUR CHILDREN.

The trustees, secretary, and other officers of the Free Hospital for Consumptives at Muskoka are daily in receipt of many piteous letters.

A few days since Mr. W. J. Gage, of Toronto, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the National Sanitarium Association, received a letter from a resident of Quebec, pleading for the admission of a victim of the dread white plague, living about a hundred miles south-east of Montreal, and asking if it were not possible to admit her into the Free Hospital. The writer says: "The applicant is a Mrs. Wm. Paterson, the mother of four children and the wife of a farmer in a place called Gosham, in the township of Windsor. The doctor says that her left lung only is troubled. She is able to go about, but her appetite is very bad. I believe if she could be admitted into the Free Hospital for Consumptives she might be cured. She could not pay much, if anything. Kindly let me know if you could receive her."

We are told by Mr. Gage that applications for admission to the Free Hospital reach the secretary from all points in the Dominion, and patients have been received from Prince Edward Island on the hundred and Alberts on the west. Two hundred and twenty-five patients have been admitted in eighteen months, and not a single patient has been refused because of his or her poverty.

We can hardly think of any charity that appeals more pathetically for the support of the Canadian people.
