A BUSINESS MAN'S LETTER. Wm. Thomson, Esq., of Orillia, Vice-President Standard Chemical Company of Toronto, Tells of a Visit to the Muskoka Free Hospital for

Consumptives.

GREATLY IMPRESSED WITH WORK BEING DONE. Personally Raises Several Hundred Dollars to Help Lessen the Load of Debt.

There can be little doubt that the National Sanitarium Association is handicapped in its great work for Consumptives in the fact that its two institutions in Muskoka are far away from any large centre of population. Few people have an opportunity to see for themselves the

"I might say there were 49 patients there last week, all poor people, most of them without a dollar in the world, and suffering from the dreadful disease. Consumption.
