**Exchange Echoes.**

Early Sunday morning when the wind whistled around the corners of the buildings producing the well known weird sounds, an attempt was made to burglarize Geo. Boettger's butcher shop on Main Street. Mr. Boettger, who sleeps directly over the shop, was awakened at 3 o'clock precisely by the sound of falling glass, and on getting up and reaching the window he heard the noise produced by footsteps rushing away. Going down into the shop he found a hole in a window pane of sufficient dimensions to permit of a man's body passing through. A hardware man in the morning stated that the pane looked very much as if it had been cut with a diamond. It would seem that the hands of the would be burglar or burglars had allowed the pane to drop, and it fell inside the window upon a stone slab. This produced the noise that awakened Mr. Boettger. The previous afternoon a large sum of money had been brought over from the bank to be used by Messrs. Brunt and Boettger in purchasing cattle. It seems that it was a customary thing to have the money taken over in this way. As a matter of fact, however, the money was not there when the attempt at robbery was made. The same night Mr. F. C. Smyth, teller of the Merchant's bank, who sleeps in the guard room, heard a peculiar sound, but attributed it to the storm outside. When the Boettger affair became known, it was recollected, and an examination it was found that the party had been taken off a side window. The next night extra precautions were taken at the bank, and the shooting irons were all in shape for immediate use. But nothing transpired.—Hanover Post.

**FOUND DEAD IN BED.**

On going into the chamber at that hour Mrs. D. noticed her husband lying very still and white with one arm raised above his head. Closer examination revealed the fact that he was unconscious. The son was despatched for a doctor and the nearest neighbor, Mr. James McGaw, was called in, and restoratives were used at once, but the vital spark had fled. The doctor on arriving pronounced death due to heart failure.

Deceased was in his 63rd year, a native of Ireland and leaves a widow and grown up family to mourn the loss of a loving husband and indulgent father. He was a member of the Mount Forest Methodist Church, but the funeral on Tuesday was at the Harrison Cemetery. The entire community sympathizes with the family in their sudden bereavement.
