Little did I think then that that man was sent up to Grey and Bruce to preach Christ and Him crucified.

Father Stewart did not come here in broadcloth and kid gloves-just the plain homespun, which was the right kind of cloth for travelling over brush and loge. His wants were so very great at times that he had to sell his cow or horse, but for all this when he would sit down to his scan y meal he would never forget to thank the Lord. Assistance was sometimes sent him from Christian men in Tcronto, whom, it seems had sent him here as, a missionary. The present generation will hardly believe me when I tell them he travelled all over Grey and Bruce for no other purpose than to fulfil the work that God sent him to do. Yes, dear friends, he did it, he finished his course and is now up yonder wearing the Crown that many are wearing.

Father Stewart had one son who is now one of the leading ministers in Rochester, and whom I trust like his father, is leading those Americans to God, While travelling through Bruce he made his home at the writers, and if the writer were an expert he would write one of the greatest histories of that old pioneer minister -a man whose life and works shall never be forgotten,- Hanover Post
