

Charged with Incendiarism.

William Stanley is one of the most wealthy and highly respected farmers in the township of Kinloss. He owns several hundred acres of prime land, situated close by the little village of Kinlough, and about five miles from the village of Kinloss, otherwise known as the Black Horse. A mile or so from the homestead is a farm owned by his son, James Stanley. The young man, however, lives for the most part at home, walking back and forth to do the chores. There was a large frame barn on this farm, the mows full of hay and grain, and the stables full of cattle, horses and sheep. On Friday morning last, between four and five o'clock a neighbor noticed that this barn was on fire, and at once proceeded to give the alarm. By the time, however, that the Stanleys and others reached the scene of the fire, the roof had fallen in and the building was a seething mass of flame. To save any of the contents was consequently impossible, and in addition to this a quantity of hay, straw, two wagons, a mower, a buggy, and other contents which were destroyed, a lot of live stock perished. This stock consisted of 16 head of cattle, 3 horses, 11 pigs, and 16 sheep. "Who set the barn on fire?" That was the question which occurred to the mind of every man on the ground for that the fire was the work of an incendiary was beyond all doubt. As soon as there was sufficient daylight a search was made for tracks, and they were not long in finding them. There were tracks to the barn, and tracks away from the barn. The adjoining farm is owned by Richard Hayes. The tracks leading to the Stanley barn had come from Hayes' premises. Some of those present then took up the tracks leading away from the barn and followed them across fields for a distance of five miles. When within a few rods of the Durham Road, they saw Richard Hayes ahead of them, and the conclusion they came to was that he was the incendiary. On striking the Durham Road he started in the direction of Riversdale. Constable J. H. Armstrong was soon in hot pursuit and came up to his man within a few rods of Riversdale. When Hayes saw Armstrong, he turned back and got into the rig with him. Later on he submitted quietly to arrest. Then he was taken before Alexander Symon J. P. and charged with arson, one of the most serious crimes in the criminal code. The trial took place the same afternoon at Kinloss. County Attorney Dixon, who had been telegraphed for conducted the case in behalf of the Crown. Several witnesses were examined, and the substance of their evidence is given above. There was no defence, and Hayes was committed to stand his trial. He was conveyed to jail the same day. He is a big strapping fellow, weighing 200 lbs. or more, and would be an ugly customer to tackle. The impression among his neighbors is that he is a little off his balance, and is a fit subject for the asylum. We understand that he will be tried summarily by Judge Barrett.—Walkerton Telescope.

Relic Hunters.

The Ontario Archeological Report for 1903 is to hand and proves to be one of the most interesting of the series. In it we notice an article by Mr. Fred Birch, of Wodehouse, charmingly written, dealing with the possible location of the Indian village, St. Mathias, or Ekarenniondi (Standing Rock) mentioned in the Jesuit Relations. Mr. Birch made an endeavor to locate it and thinks that he has found it at the caves west of Collingwood. In this he is opposed to Father Jones, who, in a former report located the Standing Rock a few miles north of Singhampton and five or six miles from the spot claimed by Mr. Birch. The difficulty of locating this village lies in the fact that the whole face of the Blue Mountains seem to have been lined in former days with Indian villages of greater or less importance. Remains of these places have been discovered at probably a dozen different places along the Nottawasaga and Collingwood escarpment, and topographical similarity makes it difficult to say that this, that, or the other is the site which is being sought. Mr. Birch is probably more nearly correct in his surmise than the other guessers. A short distance south of Glen Huron an Indian village at one time existed. We are not sure that the actual site of this village has been discovered, but a large ossuary was uncovered there years ago which denoted an Indian village in the vicinity. This would answer to the location of St. Jean as described by the Relations. The ossuary is on the Nottawasaga side, not far from the town line of Osprey and Nottawasaga. This location appears not to have been discovered by the searchers for St. Jean, who have been endeavoring to locate it further west in Osprey. If time permits, The Advance may take a hand in the hunt next summer. Mr. Birch's contribution to the question is timely and valuable.—Flesherton Advance.

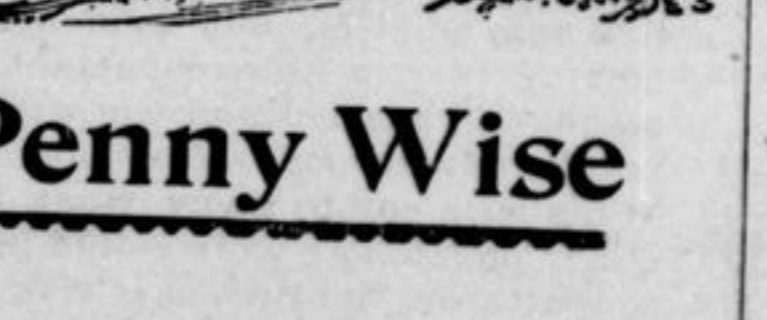

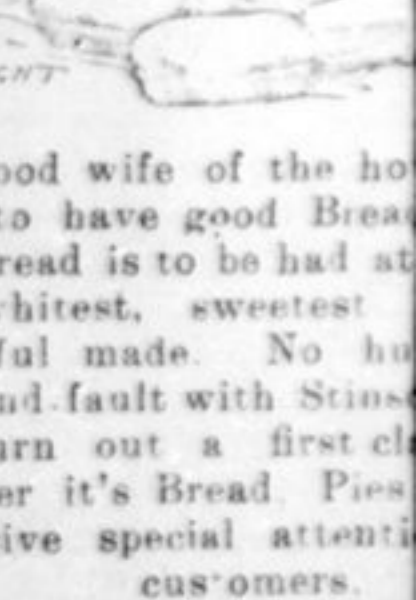
