Exchange Echoes.

Rumor has it that Mr. Wm. Richardson has disposed of his egg business. If it does the former will not get as much for their eggs in the future as they have been getting in the past. The sale includes the Ferguson business as well, but Mr. Richardson will likely retain an interest in both.—Telescope.

It is an old fallacy that a man can do as he likes with his own property. Pathmasters occasionally have trouble with farmers who positively decline to permit the public to drive through their fields in the winter or allow their fences to be taken down. Their view is that it is the duty of the authorities to keep the legal road open and that not even in the interest of the king ought fences to be destroyed or lands trespassed upon. This position is perhaps human, but according to the Municipal World, quite untenable. In answer to a correspondent who asks, "If the roads are drifted, can parties driving along let down fences and drive through the fields?" That authority replies, "If by reason of obstruction or lack of repair, a highway has become impassable, travellers may enter upon adjoining lands to obtain a free and safe passage, doing no more damage to such land than is necessary under the circumstances, without incurring any liability as trespassers."—Hanover Post.

The Telescope had a call on Tuesday from Mr. James Haycock, ex-M. P. P. and now Government inspector of binder twine. Mr. Haycock was here in his official capacity and we understand found everything at the factory quite satisfactory. The office filled by Mr. Haycock was created a year or two ago, but evidently the want of such an officer has cost the farmers thousands if not hundreds of thousands of dollars, since they began to use twine. Last year Mr. Haycock had 275,000 pounds of short twine shipped back to the United States from the Province of Manitoba, and this he estimates meant a saving to the farmers of not less than a cent a pound or \$27,500 in all. This year he has compelled the marketing down 100 tons of twine, and this will be a gain to the farmers of not less than \$10,000. Besides all this, inspection is leading to a much better article. Last year the farmers of Canada used \$3,500,000 worth of twine.—Telescope.

Henry Brenzel of the township of Bentinck was hurled into eternity on Tuesday afternoon as a result of being run down by the afternoon express train in the vicinity of Elmwood. The unfortunate man's death was instantaneous. Being deaf and dumb, his life probably at any time had not been strewn with roses, and it seemed like one of fate's incongruities that his ending should be so bad and so tragic. He was a man of about 43 years of age and unmarried. It appears that he left his home in Bentinck to walk to Elmwood and took the track for a short distance. It is presumed that after he had noticed the 3 o'clock train go South, he took for granted that the express for the north had gone up. But a man takes great chances on a track at any time for there is always a danger of the freight and the express running late. The way the trains are running on this branch makes it especially dangerous at any time. Two trains passed at Hanover on Tuesday as they often do, but of course not according to schedule. When the engineer spied Brenzel walking towards Elmwood with his back to the train, the signal whistle was blown, but of course the poor fellow could not hear. The engineer who was interrogated by a Hanover man on the train, said that he noticed the man on the track a considerable

time before the sad catastrophe occurred, but as quite frequently they have similar instances he felt no apprehension. Those on foot merely kept on their way until the train is near and then step quietly off. Of course the engineer had no idea that the man was unaware of his danger, or the train would have been stopped while there was yet time. As it was it was too late. At this point there is a down grade and the express was travelling at great speed. The victim of the accident was thrown 20 feet, his legs, back and neck being broken. The funeral will take place this afternoon at 2 o'clock to the cemetery just east of Elmwood.—Hanover Post.

Dastardly Outrage.

Welland, Ont., April 6.—Dangling from an apple tree by one arm, and stripped bare of his clothing, John, the ten-year-old son of J. W. Chambers, a farmer living about a mile from Port Robinson, was found almost dead by his mother last evening. According to the story told by the lad about 2 o'clock in the afternoon he went into the yard to gather some chips, and was seized by a man and carried into the orchard. In the orchard is a tree that has one branch which is partly decayed. About six feet from the ground was a hole about three inches in diameter, while about a foot above this was a similar cavity. Lifting the little fellow into the air, the ruffian shoved the slim little arm in the upper hole, and pulled the hand down through the hollow trunk and out of the lower aperture. The man next removed the child's clothing from the waist down. After rolling the boy's shirt and sweater up around the victim's neck, he left the body exposed to a biting cold wind, and sauntered off toward the railroad with the words: "You and another boy let my cattle out of the barn I'll let you hang there till I catch him, and then I'll let you down." The lad cried and called loudly for help, but the wind was blowing hard, and his cries were not heard. The strain on his arm was intense, and the pain severe.

About 5.30 p. m. Mrs. Chambers, who had been busy attending to her household duties, began to look for her son. The strange action of the family dog, which was at the foot of the tree, attracted the mother's attention, and the boy was taken down almost dead. The Ontario police are now on the trail of the perpetrator of the outrage who is still in the district.
