GLENELG COUNCIL.

The Council met April 16th. pursuant to adjournment. All the members present. The Reeve in the chair. Minutes of meeting held Feb. 6th and special meeting held March 19th read and confirmed. Mr. Orr Minnis applied to the council for authority to construct a line of poles for the transmission of electric energy from Hayward's Falls to Barhead Mills and By-law No. 440 for that purpose was introduced and read a first and second time.

Davis—Kerney—That By-law No. 440 giving Minnis Bros. authority to erect and construct a line of poles for electric purposes through the township of Glenelg be now read a third time, signed, sealed and engrossed on By-law book.—Carried.

Davis—McMillan—That the Reeve, Clerk and Councillor Arrowsmith be a committee to examine deviation at lot 28, con. 7 and report to this council as soon as convenient.—Carried.

Davis—Kerney—That the Clerk notify Treasurer of National Portland Cement Company to pay to Treasurer of Glenelg \$5 for drawing agreement and By-law No. 410 granting rights of way to that Co. through Glenelg.—Carried.

BRINGING THE DEAD TO LIFE.

An English scientific journal recalls some remarkable cases of resuscitation in discussing the actual danger of premature burial. There is on record the case of a man who was capsize from a scythe and sank with weights on top of him. With the exception of his left arm he was entirely submerged for almost fifteen minutes; but was revived, though with considerable difficulty, and eventually recovered. Examples of recovery after periods of submersion lasting for twenty minutes, one hour and even two hours, are recorded. Another interesting case is that of a criminal who was hanged, being suspended for twenty minutes. His death was certified to and the body removed for post mortem examination; but while the surgeons were making their preparations for work he suddenly sat up, fully alive, although he afterwards died of pulmonary congestion. Another instance relates to the surprising experience of a Russian general who was shot through the head and buried by his orderly who had satisfied himself that the officer was dead. Two hours afterwards the general reported himself to the Emperor; and it is recorded that he lived for many years and that he served, incidentally, as a pall-bearer to the orderly who had buried him. Again, there is the case of a man who took 120 grains of chloral with apparently fatal results. His respiration had ceased entirely, the sounds of his heart were imperceptible and there was no pulse at the wrist. After having been in this condition for some hours he was successfully revived and made a permanent recovery.—Harper's Weekly.

"Now, children," said the teacher, "I want each of you to think of some animal or bird and try for a moment to be like the particular one you are thinking about and make the same kind of noises it is in the habit of making." Instantly the schoolroom became a menagerie, lions roaring, dogs barking, birds singing and twittering, cows lowing, calves bleating, cats meowing, etc., all in an uproar and excitement—all, with one single exception. Off in a remote corner a little fellow was sitting perfectly still, apparently indifferent and unmindful of all the rest. The teacher, observing him, approached and said: "Waldo, why are you not taking part with the other children?" "Waiving her off with a deprecating hand and wide, rebuking eyes, he fervently whispered: "Sh—sh—sh, teacher—sh! I'm a 'ooster, and I'm a-laying a sig!"—Kansas City Star.

He Drank Laudanum.

Last Monday afternoon the four-year-old son of Mr. Geo. Rodgers, 8th line, came within an ace of losing his life by drinking laudanum. The little fellow and his brother, two or three years older, were playing in the woodshed at their home, when they saw a little bottle on a high shelf which they thought would be a fine thing to play with. So the elder boy climbed up, got the bottle, and handed it down to his brother, who drank the contents. The bottle contained laudanum, which had been left by the veterinary for a sick cow. When Mr. Rodgers came home shortly afterwards, he noticed that the little fellow was trying to stand on his head and go through all sorts of manoeuvres—he was experiencing the first effect of laudanum intoxication. The father picked up the child, which immediately went limp and apparently lifeless in his arms. Dr. Gibson was hastily summoned, and for three hours their was a struggle with death, but by means of artificial respiration and the stomach pump the little lad was brought out of danger. For some time the breathing could not be noticed, and the only sign of life was the beating of the heart. The child slept for a long time, and though weak for a few days afterwards, is all right again.—Hillsburg Beaver.

The proceedings were then adjourned until the following evening when a splendid program was successfully carried out, and a good collection taken to defray expenses.
