Minutes were then approved of and passed communications received from John Calvert claim for alleged dam- ages to barn from water diverged from its course.—From A. S. Clarke, Barrister on behalf of Dr. Mickle's Bill of Act. re Maud Reid, From R. O. Kilour Barrister, on behalf of Joseph Russell, Arthur, divergence of water course from Egremont. From Cemetery Co. Mt. Forest solici- ting aid for wire-fence.

Gordon—McArthur—That Council take no action re Calverts claim.—Carried.

Robb—McArthur—That Dr. Mick- le's Act. be not entertained, and that A. S. Clarke, Solicitor be notified to that effect and that the Tp. Solicitor be authorized to defend any action that may arise out of said claim.—Carried.

Ferguson—McArthur—That no ac- tion regarding aid to Cemetery Co. re snow-fence be taken.—Carried.

Robb—McArthur—That Commis- sioner Gordon confer with parties interested in alleged divergence of water course on townline and ar- range matters if possible.—Carried.

By-law 173 to appoint Auditors to make special Audit passed the usual reading and etc.

Gordon—McArthur—That Comr. Robb examine required bridge at W. Cowan's, and take what action he deems best.

Comr. Robb's reported John Isles had plowed 200 rods 20th side-road Con. 8 9 preparatory for grader cost \$2.50. Found that the river at Lot 24 Con. 8 was washing into the road bed, and asked for some other mem- ber of Council to examine situation and consult with him.

Ferguson—McArthur—That Comr. Robb report be adopted and Comr. Gordon accompany him to said local- ity for consultation. Carried.

Comr. Ferguson reported inspec- tion of completion of job on Wilson's hill last year to James McBeth and found it satisfactory completed and recommended payment of balance on contract \$4.00.

Gordon—McArthur—That report be adopted.—Carried.

The reeve and Comr. McArthur, as a committee reported on the griev- ance of water course said to be di- verted, at Orchardville—Also on new Treas Sureties.

They interviewed parties concerned and found Mr. Pinder was trying to convey the water to what they con- sidered its proper course, and he agreed to do his utmost to confine it in its proper place.

Found the culvert across the O. S. R. outlet of said water course too small and recommended a 20 inch tile be put in. Also examined Registry office regarding the properties offered as security for new Treas. and found these satisfactory.

Robb—Gordon—That foregoing re- port be adopted and said Committee be paid \$2 50 each. Com. fees and Thomas Lauder be paid \$1.75 cost of search.—Carried.

Comr. Gordon reported on pur- chasing cedar and repairing road and protection at lot 5 Con. 5 6. W. Patterson cedar \$13; Chas. Scriber posts 50c. For labor W. McIntyre 2 1/2 days \$3.15; John Mapletoft 2 1/2 days \$3.15; W. McIntyre teaming \$2 do. repair bridge 25c.

McArthur—Robb—That Comr. Gordon's report be adopted and he receive \$2 Com. fees.—Carried.

The Auditors presented their special Audit showing Bank Credit \$1573.56. Cash in Treas. hands \$41. 38.

Robb—Ferguson—That the Aud- itors report of special Audit be adopt- ed as read and they receive \$3.00 each for their services.—Carried.

McArthur—Gordon—That the reeve and clerk be a committee to examine all papers, books and chat- tels belonging to the Tp. in posses- sion of the retiring Treas. and make an inventory of the same and hand them over to the new Treasurer.—Carried.

McArthur—Robb—That the reeve and clerk be a committee to draft a memorial from this council to be pre- sented to Mr. Brown at next session of council.—Carried.

Gordon—Robb—That having re- ceived no reply from Tp. Engineer—The clerk is instructed to notify him to attend the grievance on Egt. and Proton townline at once.—Carried.

Comr. Robb reported that his mo- tion last council meeting re winter work last winter on Base line. The amount offered was not accepted and recommended account to be paid in full \$3.85 balance.

McArthur—Gordon—That forego- ing report be adopted and order granted.—Carried.

McArthur—Ferguson—That the Comrs. of the several divisions be instructed to repair or build any bridges or culverts that require at- tention.—Carried.

Regarding grant made by Proton and a supplement asked resolved that as a drain is to go in affecting town line, the matter of a grant must be delayed and the ex-reeve of Egremont says that Egt. has done its full share of expenditure on said townline. Comr. Gordon reported that A. Ste- wart and D. Rowland had spent 3 1/2 of a day removing the snow of Mr. Mc Nairs bridge cost 50c. each, and S. Cowan team on grader \$300.

Ferguson—Robb—That foregoing report be adopted.—Carried.

Ferguson—Gordon—That we pay Calder and Klempf the balance of Acct. viz. \$2.00 use of Hall for Nom- ination.—Carried.

The reeve reported on Dromore sidewalks and lumber—Stated the residents agreed to put sidewalks in repair for one year at no cost to Municipality.—They decided to sell the lumber purchased in 1903, at no less than what it cost, and to extend money realized for sidewalks, and render accounts thereof to the coun- cil.

Robb—McArthur—That the reeves report be adopted.—Carried.

Gordon—Ferguson—That Comr. McArthur be appointed to investigate the grievance between Mr. Campbell and Robb and try to settle the matter.—Carried.
