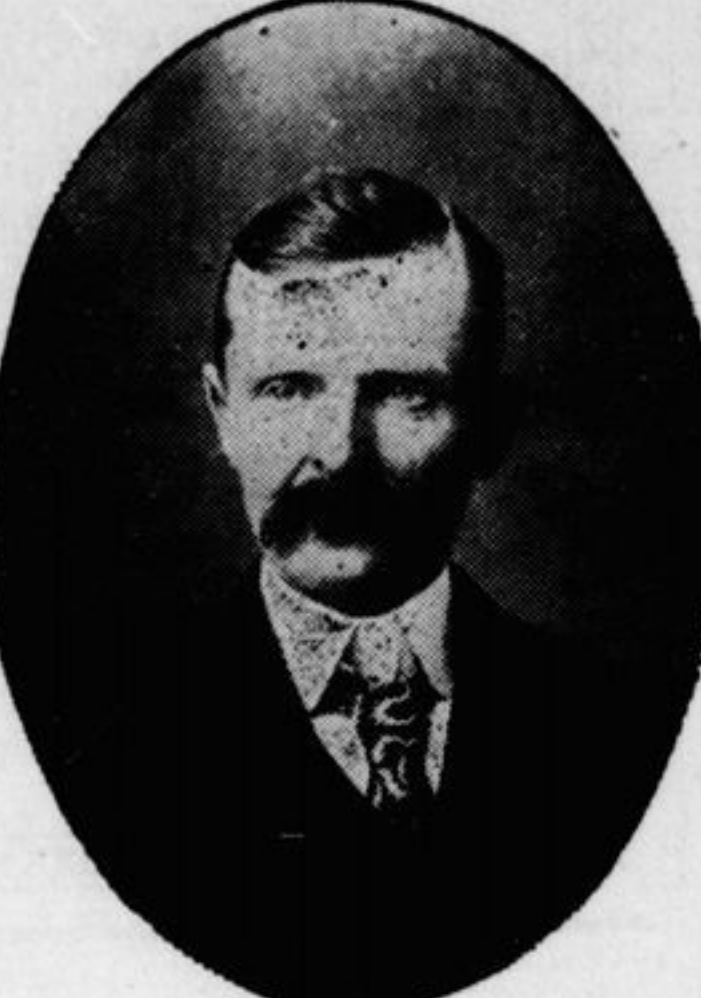

nozzles and other essentials; that C. Gordon be appointed inspector to carry out the agreement, plans, etc., of the barn now in course of erection and that the treasurer be authorized to pay progress estimates as issued by the inspector; that notices for bidding trespassing be posted in conspicuous places; that on the building being taken over the clerk write the provincial secretary for the grant of \$4,000; that accounts be paid as follows:—John McQuaker & Co., \$24-47; that the clerk have that part of the bylaw setting forth rules for the guidance of inmates printed for posting each room. The council went into committee of the whole with Mr. McLean. The report was adopted without amendment.

A report of the printing committee recommended the payment of accounts as follows: John A. Richardson \$51.75; McCallum Co. \$3.50; C. W. Rudge, \$3. The report was adopted.

The opinion of A. G. McKay respecting hawkers' and peddlers license was ordered to be engrossed in the minutes.

A resolution of sympathy with Mr. and Mrs. Harness was unanimously adopted, the hope being expressed that the former's recovery would be rapid.

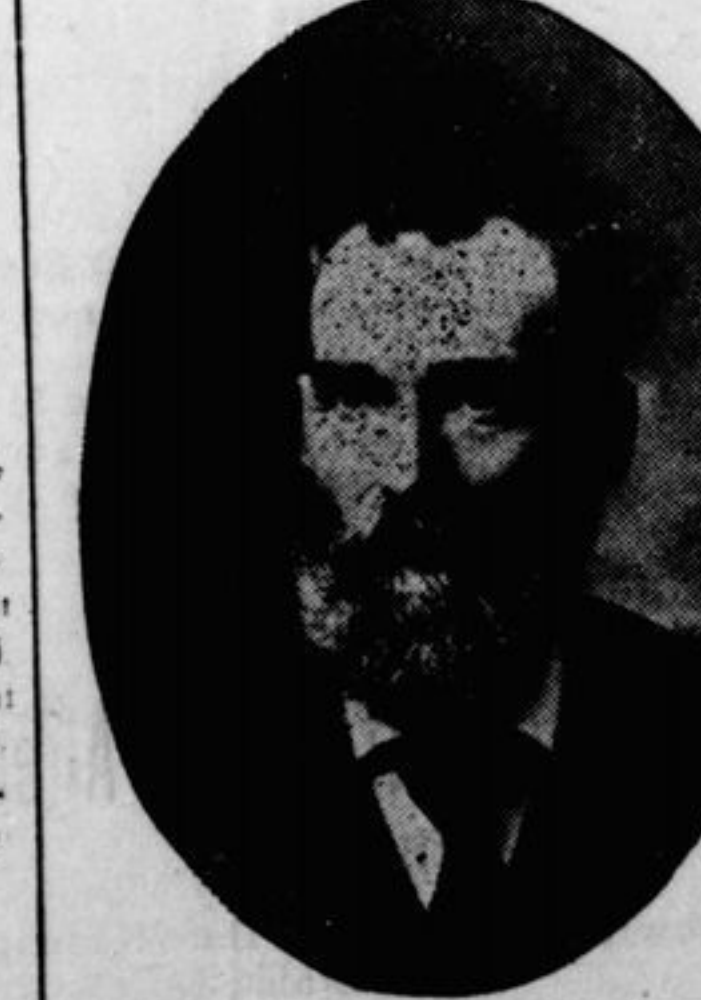


CHAS. GORDON, Chairman of Building Committee.

On Saturday morning there was a stormy scene at the session arising out of what Mr. Gordon regarded as interference in the business relations between himself and Mr. Richards, the contractor. After a hot cross fire Mr. Gordon wrote out his resignation saying that he was not forced to put up with interference from any source and that the others could settle the difficulty in their own way. The resignation was not accepted.

The warden pointed out that this matter had been discussed at the meeting two weeks ago and that the discussion was out of order.

Mr. Gordon presented a report of the county property committee. It recommended that the chairman purchase a suitable desk and chair for Judge Hatton's chambers; that the treasurer pay the certified pay sheets for repairs, etc., to the turn-
