There seems a great tendency always to shower encomiums of praise, on anything from a distance, while disloyalty to home institutions, is discouraging to the best efforts of the Canadian output. We are a growing country, a progressive country and in science, art and literature encouragement should be given to Canadian development. We are no longer an obscure nation, and while we may not yet occupy the first rank, the progress we have made during the last fifty years should embolden every Canadian citizen with a pardonable pride and fill him with loyalty to our Canadian institutions. No good citizen will condemn what's good in other countries, but on the other hand he shouldn't fail to be loyal to his home.

The United States a hundred years ago was in a state of embryo; to-day it ranks as one of the great nations of the earth. So far as population is concerned we are small in comparison, but we have the territory and the material, for a very rapid development and no man to-day can sit down and count on the possibilities of the next half century. In telegraphs, telephones, railways and general development we are taking no mean part, and we hope the time will soon come when no Canadian away from home will be ashamed to acknowledge Canada as the land of his birth or the land of his adoption. No matter what our ancestors may have been, we are all Canadians either by birth or adoption, and we shouldn't be ashamed to say so.

The big show in Toronto has passed into history for another year, and from start to finish they had extra good show weather. The attendance was large, over a hundred thousand being on the grounds one day during the exhibit. The fair is pronounced good and the grand stand attractions were evidently pleasing from the large attendance to be seen there in the afternoons and evenings. After all, it seems that agricultural exhibits need some special attractions to draw the crowds, and however much such features may be condemned, the mind of the young agrarian seems to crave for something out of the ordinary pursuit of regular routine work on the farm. The athletic and trapeze exhibitions are eye openers to most spectators, and show the extent to which the human body can be controlled by long development. The bicycle leap was a dare-devil performance, and it is quite possible that the exhibitor will make the leap once too often. The Black Watch Band was a special attraction, and was no doubt a good musical aggregation. To the uncultivated musical ear, however, any good city band would have been just as entertaining. This is not intended as a slight on the performers by any means, but simply an acknow-

ledgement that the musical taste of the writer is not sufficiently acute to notice the superiority of the Black Watch, that is if they had superior musical ability.

“Newspapers are always lying.” That's what some people say about the press generally. Few people with any sense however will be guilty of making such a charge and the self-respecting newspaper man to-day is just as careful to give the truth as any man in the community. What nonsense it is to think that any newspaper would indulge in deliberate lying when the whole reading constituency is anxiously watching to find a flaw in its character. The success of any legitimate newspaper depends to a large extent if not wholly on the truthfulness of its representation of things as they are. The man who holds different views from another man and gives expression to those views, is lying just as much as the newspaper which differs in opinion from some other newspaper. Everybody will admit that there are some scoundrels amongst the Grits, but no man of any standing whatever, will say that all the Grits are scoundrels, nor yet that all the Tories are hump-backed because of the weight of their virtues. Some newspapers, it is true, are not truthful, but taking them generally their veracity should not be complained of. It is possible to conceive of preachers lying, but preachers as a rule get credit for being truthful. It will never do to condemn everybody in a class because one may show himself a little crooked.

Next Wednesday and Thursday are the days of Durham Fair, and if loyalty to Canada is essential to good Canadian citizenship, loyalty to our own smaller institutions is essential to their best national interests. This is not a big national exhibition, but it is the duty of us all to use every effort to make it a big county show. The exhibits are not going to be so great as they are in the larger centres with greater territory to draw from, nor will the attractions be so numerous and it would be foolishness to indulge in fulsome boasting that would never materialize and reflect dishonorably on the honesty of the press which may be regarded as a first principle of its influence. The show here will be purely local and each exhibitor will have on exhibition the very best in his products of the kind. The display of weeds by teachers taking an interest in that feature of this year's exhibition will have, or should have, special interest to every teacher and student of our public schools, as well as every farmer in the whole community. The fakir, as we intimated in weeks gone by will be an absent quantity, and the foolish ones who can find nothing better to amuse them than throwing money away on a pure game of chance will have no business at this year's fair. Considerable improvements have been made in the buildings and better accommodation for cattle than has hitherto been furnished is now offered to the exhibiting stockmen. Everything taken into consideration, the prospects are bright for a good local exhibition and let us hope there will be a good turn out. Don't forget the dates—Wednesday and Thursday the 21st and 22nd September.
