ROASTING THE WELLINGTONS.

One often hears the complaint that Owen Sounders do not patronize the cross games as they should. Who can blame them after seeing such a disgraceful exhibition of slugging as they were treated to at the Wellington-Woodbridge game last Friday? Owen Sound never had a sicker or more disgusted crowd of spectators than those who witnessed that game. It has come to be a serious matter when a few players will throw up all chances of the junior championship for the sake of personal spite and utter ugliness of disposition. The Wellingtons could have won out the round if they had been content to devote their attention to scoring goals rather than chopping up their opponents. It stamped a number of players on that team with a mark of low down cowardice when they slugged and smashed the visiting players unmercifully. It was only when they got their opponents in a place where they were sure they could not be repaid that they started their brutality. The worst offenders were not the best players on the team. Thrt they were permitted to butcher a team that came from a neighboring town seems altogether too bad. It was the same players that started the trouble at the 24th of May game with the Greys. They are very brave when they play on the home grounds where they are under the eye of their friends, but when they are on the opponent's grounds they are almost always too scared to be of any great value to the club. It is a sore disappointment to the citizens who have supported the team throughout the season, and the management of the club, who so untiringly worked to advance its best interests, only to see the whole season's work thrown away.

How long is Owen Sound going to stand for this kind of thing? Are a few irresponsible cowards to be allowed to give Owen Sound the standing of being one of the low down sporting towns in the Dominion? Is a town of this size to be the subject of ridicule because of the shortsightedness of a few youths who have yet to learn the first principles of common decency? If the management of the Wellington lacrosse club appeals to the public for support next year, as they no doubt will, they will have to substitute other players for a few of the prominent offenders in Friday's game before they can secure the patronage of the right thinking people of Owen Sound.—O. S. Sun.

MANITOULIN OIL FIELDS.

From reports received the company developing on Manitoulin Island seem to have a good chance of obtaining oil in paying quantities. Senator Poirier, of Sledia, N. B. is operating at Ban Lake with two rigs. This point is north of Manitowaning, and the Northern Oil and Gas Co., of Chicago, are drilling east of that place, near Wikwemodong. The old well of 1866 as well as those of 1898 still run oil while the two put down this season have plenty in sight. No 2 stands at 150 feet oil and can not be lowered with the means at command and pumping rig and tank have been ordered. No 3, now going down, will prove the field and it is thought that one hundred wells can be made to produce in this section alone. No shooting has yet been done on any of the wells. When this is done startling developments may be expected as no well on the Island has yet been shot. Notwithstanding this one of the 1866 wells pumped 300 barrels. This oil is of the highest quality, testing 860 specific gravity and 33 Beaume. Other wells have been drilled down South of Manitowaning.—O. S. Sun.

That Apple.

The Walkerton Fruit Grower's Association shipped a car-load of apples to Portage La Prairie this fall and one of the barrels on being opened was found to contain besides the apples the following poetical effusion addressed to whoever might buy the apples:—

Here's to the juice of the fruit of the vine,
 Here's to your good health and mine
 If you'll be constant, I'll be true,
 And leave my happy home for you.

Then followed the query, "How do you like the apples?" The missive was signed with the true name of a Walkerton girl, and was duly forwarded to the Telescope office, by the man who bought the apples. We beg to assure him that the young lady is all right, and that if he wants a wife, he might go farther and fare worse.—Walkerton Telescope.

Our Next Governor-General.

Earl Grey, who is to be Canada's next Governor-General, possesses a most striking personality which should be of peculiar interest to the people of this country owing to the fact that the name is the same as his, and the family coat of arms is embodied in the county seal, by his permission.

In appearance Earl Grey is tall, big-boned and loose jointed. He has a high smooth-domed forehead, and baldness extending well down the back and sides of the head. The hair and mustache is sandy, the latter bushy and clipped off in an irregular line. The under lip protrudes slightly, casting a faint shadow between the full mouth and square chin. The general appearance is that of the English north countryman, which he is, his home being in Northumberland.

Previous to his accession to the peerage he sat for three terms in Parliament as a Liberal, but politically he is a puzzle. He is friend of W. H. Stead, but doesn't agree by any means with that gentleman's pro-British ideas in regard to South Africa. He was administrator in 1896 of Rhodesia and was a great friend of the late Cecil Rhodes, and is now one of the executors of deceased a great estate.

In England Lord Grey is particularly known for his connection with the temperance reform movement. He is the prime mover in the so-called Public House Trust, which operates drinking places in England somewhat on the same line as the one in New York city upon which Bishop Potter recently bestowed his episcopal blessing. Lord Grey derived his idea, however, from Sweden and it is known as the Gothenburg system. The drink shops keep alcoholic drinks the same as any other resort, but the liquor is of the very best quality. No profit is allowed the manager on alcoholic drinks, while he is given a handsome percentage on all "soft" drinks, tea and coffee. This results in the sale of innocent beverages being pushed and customers are thereby restrained from over indulgence. These saloons have become literally the poor man's clubs and are welcomed by the better people of England.

It will therefore be seen he is of a practical and philanthropic turn of mind, and is therefore patterned somewhat after our favorite among Governor-Generals, Lord Aberdeen.
