The tenth Annual Convention of the East Grey Sabbath School Association was held here on the 19th inst. There was a fair attendance of delegates and the convention was on the whole interesting and profitable.

The morning session was held in the Baptist church. After a song service and devotional exercises conducted by Rev. Mr. Wilson and the president, Mr. W. G. Mr. Carr, presented the report of the committee on resolutions and a vote of thanks was tendered the retiring officers for their labors and all who had contributed to the success of the convention.

Upon the report of the Nomenclature committee were elected as follows: Pres. Mr. Fawcett, Heathcote; Vice Pres. Mr. Bunt, Flesherton; Sec Trea, Mr. Davidson, Clarksburg; representative to provincial convention Mr. Pickell, Markdale. Heathcote was chosen for next annual meeting. Rev. Buchanan then interestingly taught the S S lesson for last Sabbath after which Rev. Mr. Wellwood gave a good address on Parental responsibility. Miss Zilla Trimble and Mrs. Blackburn rendered pleasing solos. After a few words of exhortation from the president the closing hymn was sung and Rev. Mr. Wilson pronounced the benediction.
