GREY COUNTY GAOL.

The annual report of the Grey
county gaol was completed by Gover-
nor John Miller, and is ready for
return to the government inspector
of prisons. During the year there
were one hundred and fifty prisoners
in custody of whom seven were fe-
males. The number committed dur-
ing the year was one hundred and
thirty six. Of this number seventy
four were committed for the first
time, twenty for the second time,
five for the third time, and thirty-
seven for more than three times. One
seventeen was committed as a witness
on a criminal case, seven for insanity,
two for debt, twenty two were ac-
quitted, and five were on trial and
discharged by order of the court,
without trial. One died before trial,
and one was released on suspended
sentence. Seventeen were taken to
the Central prison, six to Kingston,
one to the Mercer Reformatory, and
two died while undergoing sentence.
Twenty-three were sentenced for pe-
riods under thirty days, sixteen un-
der two months, thirteen for three
months, thirteen for six months, two
for five months, twelve for six months,
three for one year, one for two years,
and six for three years or over. Fifty
six of these prisoners had their cost
of maintenance defrayed by the mun-
icipalities. The total days served by
the government prisoners was 1649;
by municipal prisoners 5508; in all
7157. As to nationality 78 were Ca-
nadians, 31 English, 10 Irish, 9
Scotch, 7 United States, one from
Germany. In religious belief they
were divided as follows: Roman
Catholics, 25; Church of Eng-
land, 42; Presbyterians, 23; Metho-
dists, 25; other denominations, 21.
Thirty-six were married, one hun-
dred and four were bachelors, one
greater or less degree. The gaol ex-
penditure for fuel, food, clothing,
repairs, \$107; for salaries, \$1850;
etc., was \$1574.75; total, \$3531.75.
The daily cost per prisoner was 11 1/2c
as compared with about 11c for
1903. There are thirty-two cells in
the gaol. The greatest number con-
fined at one time was 25; the small-
est number 13. There are at present
four insane persons in the gaol. The
crimes cover a wide range, including
assaults, bigamy, burglary, cutting
and wounding, escaping from or ob-
structing a constable, larceny, per-
jury, rape, trespass, and vagrancy.
Vagrancy leads with 45, and larceny
follows with 26. Their occupations
varied. Nine were farmers, two
mechanics, three dentists five coop-
ers, one clerk, three carpenters, one
bricklayer, two shoemakers, one
agent, eighty laborers, two masons,
one photographer, one prostitute,
six sailors, one washerwoman, two
tailors, one tanner, two teamsters
and eight of other occupations not
enumerated. Last year only 127
prisoners were in custody which
shows that we are going to the bad
again. This is the forty-second re-
port returned by the present govern-
or.—Owen Sound Times.

St. Catharines, Oct. 29.—A severe
explosion occurred at the Conserva-
tive committee rooms, St. Paul street
yesterday afternoon. The Gas Com-
pany were laying a new main to the
building and in some way this be-
came disconnected and the cellar
filled with gas. One of the workmen
lit a match and a terrible explosion
followed, tearing the plaster from
the walls and ceilings, smashing
windows and shaking the building
from cellar to roof. Although there
was a number in the building at the
time, fortunately no one was injured.

A newspaper man, fond of honey,
visited a neighboring city recently
and at one of the hotels was served
with delicious honey. He enjoyed it
so much that he told his wife all
about it. On his next trip to the city
she accompanied him to this hotel
and when the noon meal was being
served he did not appear. The
newspaper man therefore, beckoned
a waiter and said: "Say, Sambo
where is my honey?" He was al-
most paralyzed when the worthy
grinned and replied: "She don't
work here no more boss. She done
got a job at de silk mill." The wife
received a handsome new dress be-
fore they returned home.

On November 6th, 1901, Mrs. W.
A. Grier, while in Guelph posted a
letter to her husband, who was at
that time the member of a hunting
party to Point Aux Baril. Mr. Grier
who in the meantime had grown in
the good graces of the inhabitants of
Owen Sound and had served as chief
magistrate for nearly two years, re-
ceived Thursday morning a letter
forwarded from Point Aux Baril—
the same letter that the Owen Sound
lady had written nearly three years
ago. An explanation can only be
guessed, but it is probable that Sir
Wm. Mulock was holding back in
order that the interest on the postage
stamp would swell the surplus.—O.
S. Times.

Mr. John Moriarty, lineman with
the electric light department, got a
severe shock from a live electric wire
on Tuesday afternoon. Had he re-
ceived the full force of the current
of 2,000 volts which was on the wire
he would have been instantly killed.
In company with Mr. Wm. McLinden
he was installing incandescent lights
in the Wm. Kennedy & Sons Co's
new office and was placing a trans-
former on a pole opposite. The elec-
tricians claim that they had been as-
sured by the electric light staff at
Inglis Falls that there was no danger
in working with the wires. About
5 o'clock as Mr. Moriarty was leaning
against a wire at the top of the pole
the current was turned on. Had it
not been for the insulation on the
wires, which broke the current to
some extent, he would have been in-
stantly killed. He could not drop
the wires and before he could release
his grasp on the wire his limbs were
severely burned and his hands and
back painfully injured. Mr. William
McLinden immediately telephoned to
the works and the current was shut
off. A ladder was brought so that
the injured man could be removed
from the wires, but it was too short
and a fire alarm was turned in with
the object of getting a longer one.
Before the prompt arrival of the
brigade, Moriarty had sufficiently re-
covered to lower himself to the short
ladder. He was removed to Kennedy's
office and afterwards to his room at
the Central Hotel, where he is re-
covering rapidly from the effects of
the accident. There was a rumor
that an action for damages would be
taken against the corporation, but
such is not the case, although Mr.
Moriarty believes that the current
should not have been turned on at
the time.—O. S. Sun.
