**Rodger's Clever Work**

Inspector Rodgers, of the Provincial Police, has just returned from the western part of the Province, where he ran down a case of obscene letter writing, and it is hoped has thus put a stop to an abominable practice. The way this was unravelled was very interesting. Some letters addressed to ladies in Hanover and posted in Aytou, Grey County, had insufficient postage, and were sent to Toronto dead letter office. Here they were found to be anonymous obscene letters, and they were turned over to the Attorney General's Department. Inspector Rodgers going to Hanover to investigate, found that these letters, red-tinged on a character of a certain lady, were not only posted to other ladies, but were dropped on the street, where they were found by school-children, tacked up on fences, etc. After looking over the situation, Inspector Rodgers arrested Eli Wissler of Neustadt, a village between Hanover and Aytou, and examinations of Wissler's handwriting and spelling convinced the detective that he had the right man. Wissler was brought before Magistrate William H. Ryan, pleaded guilty, and was sent down to the Central Prison for one year. Wissler is 66 years of age and is a vendor of patent medicines.

**Whitney on Temperance.**  
 (Toronto News.)

Mr. Whitney's position on the question of prohibition is at least candid and consistent. He has stated frankly, on occasion demanded, that he is opposed to the enactment of a prohibitory law. He is not behind the Liberal party in deploring temperance, but he takes the ground that the way to meet it is to "decrease the number of licenses, to remove the commissioners and inspectors from political and party influences, and enforce the license law honestly, and with the whole power of the Government." It is not clear how he intends to remove the commissioners and inspectors from political and party influences; but the other two clauses are clear enough, and lie at the root of the whole question of temperance reform. To limit the number of licenses to the actual demands of a community, and then rigidly enforce the law against the license-holder or illicit dealer is to follow closely the trend of public sentiment, and be in a position to add to the restrictions as public opinion demands. This is too conservative a course to satisfy the prohibitionists, and by adopting it Mr. Whitney may lose many votes. That is perhaps the most creditable feature of his policy. He rejects the suggestion to trim his sails to catch the breeze that would carry him into power, and prefers to stand squarely opposed to a policy which he would not carry out if he could, and perhaps could not if he would. Without going into the merits of the question it must be conceded that Mr. Whitney's attitude is honorable alike to himself and his party.
