The Western Fever.

We venture to state that the "western fever" is more prevalent to-day in Canada than ever before and that it will become more acute. The agencies to that end are various. Trade expansion, following the rapid settlement of land areas is responsible for much of the movement. The branch wholesale warehouse in the prairie country affords a step up towards the ambitious Eastern clerk. The prospective construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific will induce thousands to move towards the land of the setting sun. All classes follow a railroad; the farmer who prefers new openings, the land agent who induces settlers in settlements of his own location, and the various kinds of people who feed, clothe, and labor for the settlers at the front. In their train follow the hundred and one varieties of tradesmen and professional men who serve their fellows. The young men of the Eastern cities have a tempting prospect opening up before them. Before deciding to "settle down" they would do well to ponder over Horace Greeley's historic words of advice: "Go West young man!"—Montreal Star.

Fewer Exhibitions Desired.

The leading Agricultural societies of the Province are evincing considerable interest in the suggestions that has been made by Mr. H. B. Cowan, Provincial Superintendent of Agricultural societies, that the number of exhibitions held annually in Ontario should be materially reduced and that Agricultural Societies should receive their grants in proportion to the amounts they expend for agricultural purposes. Such a change would do away with all distinction between the township and the district societies.

The Ontario Fruit Grower's Association has passed a resolution approving of these suggestions and expressing the belief that such a change would result in larger sums of money being expended for agricultural purposes. The Executive of the Dominion Shorthorn Breeders Association, at its annual meeting in Toronto, on January 16th, also passed a resolution approving of these suggestions and stating its opinion that fewer exhibitions would result in larger attendances, better prizes and better exhibits, as well as a reduction in the undesirable features now so prevalent at many exhibitions.
