GREY COUNTY COUNCIL.

(Markdale Standard)
The recently elected County Council of Grey held its first session in the council chamber on Tuesday morning, January 24th. The members of the council, all of whom were present, are Messrs McArthur, Preston, Pringle, McColman, Bell, Brown, McCannel, Schute, Schenk, R. L. Frost, J. W. Frost, Ball, Allan, Patterson, Westaway. Nominations for the Warden's chair resulted in the naming of Messrs McArthur, Thompson and Paterson. Messrs. Thompson and Paterson voluntarily withdrew from the contest and Mr. McArthur, who was nominated by Messrs. McColman and Schenk, was unanimously elected Warden. A special committee was appointed to strike the standing committees for the coming year.
On Wednesday morning Mr. Allan presented the report of the special committee appointed on the previous day. This report recommended that the standing committees for the year be as follows, the first named gentleman in each committee being chairman:—
Finance—All the members of the council, Mr. Preston, Chairman.
Roads and Bridges—Messrs. Schute, Pringle, McColman, Bell, Brown, McCannel, Schenk and R. L. Frost.
County Property—Thompson, Allan, Preston, Ball, Bell, J. W. Frost, Paterson, Westaway.
Education—Ball, Schute, McColman, McCannel, Allan, J. W. Frost, Pringle, Brown.
Printing—Paterson, Schenk, Westaway, Thompson, Bell, Preston, R. L. Frost, Ball.
Communications and Memorials—McColman, J. W. Frost, Westaway, Brown, Ball, Bell, Allan, Schute.
House of Refuge—Allan, Paterson and the Warden.
Warden's Committee—Preston, J. W. Frost, and Pringle.
Judicial Audit—McColman, Brown and the Judicial Auditor.
This report was adopted unanimously and after the transaction of considerable routine business the council adjourned.
Thursday morning a large number of accounts were received and referred to the several committees. Mr. Preston presented Report No. 1 of the Finance committee recommending payment of a large number of accounts. This report was adopted and the council adjourned to meet at ten o'clock Friday morning.
FRIDAY MORNING.
A large number of communications were received at Friday morning's session, among which was an application of Turnkey, W. H. Wright, of the County gaol, for an increase in salary of \$100.
Report No. 1 of Finance committee recommending payment of many accounts was adopted.

Mr. John Frock, a member of the Honover town Council, addressed the council and solicited their guarantee of the town of Hanover's debentures.

Messrs. A. F. Armstrong, Owen Sound and George Binnie, Glenelg, were appointed County Auditors; John Muxlow, of Meaford, was appointed representative in the Meaford School Board; and Rev. Rural Dean Ardill to the Owen Sound Board of Education.

Schenk-Ball—That a special grant of \$100 be made to improve the deviation road at Weaver's bridge on the county line between Carrick and Normanby. This matter was referred to the Road and Bridge committee. Council then adjourned.

FRIDAY EVENING.

Mr. Preston presented report No. 3 of Finance committee. This report was dealt with in committee of the whole, Mr. Fringle in the chair, and was fully adopted. Mr. Thompson's report of the County Property committee was adopted.

The Clerk presented his report concerning supplies for the county gaol which was adopted.

Rev. Jas Lediard, representing the Owen Sound Ministerial Association, addressed the council, referring to the necessity of conducting brief funeral services when inmates of the gaol passed away.

Superintendent Harness, of the House of Refuge pointed out that a burial plot for the interment of deceased inmates of the Home was absolutely necessary. The question was referred to the House of Refuge committee.
Messrs. Paterson and McColman introduced By-law No. 671, guaranteeing debentures of the town of Hanover to the extent of \$15,000. The by-law passed its first and second readings and on the following day passed its third reading.

On motion of J. W. Frost and R. L. Frost the H. of R. committee was instructed and authorized to procure a suitable burying plot in the Markdale cemetery for the interment of deceased inmates, and to furnish coffins for same.
Council then adjourned.

SATURDAY MORNING.

On Saturday morning the Clerk read the report of Mr. N. W. Campbell, Public School Inspector for South Grey. Mr. Bell moved that this report be adopted and printed in the minutes.—Carried.

The badge for County Constables which the council had ordered to be manufactured at the November session, was inspected by the councillors.

Mr. Schute presented report No. 1 Road and Bridge committee, recommending: The payment of several

accounts in connection with Crow's bridge; that Mr. Schenk's request for \$100 for improvement of the deviation road at Weaver's bridge be not entertained. Adopted.

In behalf of the board of the General and Marine Hospital Dr. C. M. Lang appealed to the council for a grant of at least \$10,000 for the enlargement of the hospital. Dr. Lang pointed out that the hospital was a county institution, but its capacity was quite inadequate as many would be patients had been refused admission on account of the building's limited accommodating powers. He had solicited financial assistance from Andrew Carnegie, Lord Mountsephen, Hon. Wm. Muloch, Lord Strathcona and Sir Wm. McDonald without the desired result. The operating room should be modernized without delay.

Rev. Father Buckley and Dr. T. H. Middlebro also impressed upon the council the necessity of enlarging the hospital immediately.

Mr. Shute presented a special report of the Road and Bridge committee, stating that the two bridges spanning the Bighead river had been completed in a satisfactory manner, and the cost, \$1294, had exceeded the engineer's estimate by \$37.

On motion of J. W. Frost, Gaoler Miller was requested to notify Rev. R. Rodgers, Secretary of the Ministerial Association, when the undertaker would arrive at the gaol in case of a death, in order that a member of the association might be present to conduct a brief funeral service, and that the relatives of the deceased be immediately notified of his demise.

Mr. J. W. Frost gave notice of his intention to altar by-law No. 644, concerning the maintenance of members of the Markdale House of Refuge.

Mr. Allan censured the deputation from the hospital board for making their request at the eleventh hour. He moved that the motion be deferred to the June session.—Carried.

On motion of Mr. Schenk council adjourned to meet at Owen Sound on June 19th, at 2 o'clock, p. m.
