Another from a married woman who is preparing herself for missionary work in China writes me enclosing a sum of money for a small article she took when going to school, and tells me her conscience was aroused while studying the book of Leviticus, the first seven verses of the sixth chapter, especially where it counsels us to "confess our sin and make restitution," and she says unless she met the conditions the Lord could not bless her. While reading her letter that fine old hymn came to my mind, "God moves in a mysterious way," etc. A third came from a party now living in the States, and was for an article purchased and not previously paid for. This one remits nearly double the price of the goods which had been purchased nearly ten years ago. I might add that the conscience money so far received I have handed to the Salvation Army, who will use it in helping the poor and unfortunate, and if there are others who have wronged me in the past and desire to make restitution I will keep their names strictly confidential and appropriate such sums to charitable purposes."

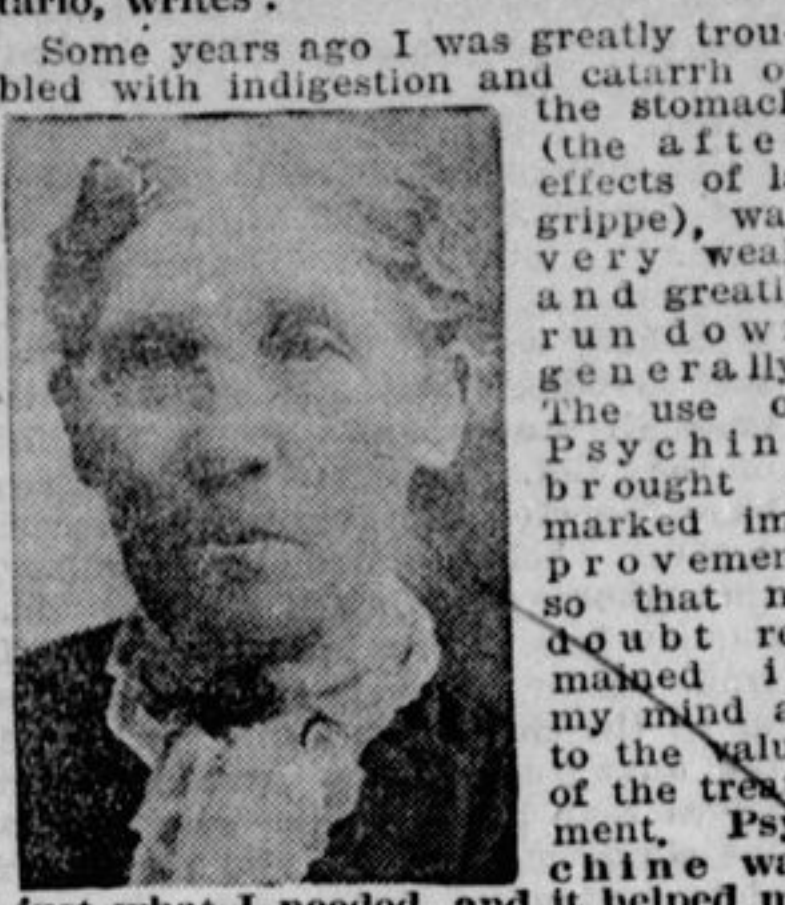
