### Flesherton.

(Intended for last week.)

Artemesia Council met on Saturday last and among other things received the auditor's report for 1904, of which the abstract statement showed the receipts to have been as follows: Cash on hand, \$1154.44; resident taxes, \$1586.12; Non-resident taxes, \$115.38; fines, \$26.00; licenses, \$155.50; debentures, \$112.84; loans, \$3000.00; miscellaneous, \$74.36; Expenditure—Salaries, etc., \$1070.45; stationery and printing, \$122.04; law costs, \$724.20; roads and bridges, \$2256.48; charity, \$161.55; county rate, \$1927.64; schools, \$7545.93; Board of Health, \$6.00; debentures, \$62.47; coupons and debentures, \$278.50; loans, \$3062.55; sinking fund, \$477.24; miscellaneous, \$235.98; Flesherton Police Trustees, \$672.62; balance on hand, \$107.59; total, \$20505.24. The total expenditure was \$1230 less than the previous year. In law costs there was an increase of \$119 and to schools, \$309, but on roads and bridges there was a decrease of \$874, and the county rate swung back \$316 on the \$424 increase

in 1903. The assets of the township were shown to be \$9757, and the liabilities, principally for school debentures, \$8610. The total uncollected taxes for 1904 were only \$203.97, the balance being in Divisions No. 1, 3 and 4. Mr. W. L. Wright, collector in No. 5, returned his roll complete. Flesherton Police Trustees expended on streets \$662.62; paid township treasurer village proportion of salaries, etc., \$73.21; of law costs, \$53.01; of bridges, \$53.68, of interest, \$4.46; and closed with balance of cash on hand of \$175.70; total, \$1026.68.

### A Peculiar case in Normanby.

The Hospital for Sick Children, College Street, Toronto, appeals to the fathers and mothers of Ontario for funds to maintain the thousand sick children that it nurses within its walls every year.

The Hospital is not a local institution—but Provincial. The sick child from any place in Ontario who can't afford to pay has the same privileges as the child living in Toronto and is treated free.
