THE FARMER'S ICE HOUSE

(By Prof. J. B. Reynolds, of O. A. C.) The season of the year has arrived when the ice house may be filled. There is no reason why most farm houses may not have a continuous supply of ice throughout the summer. Where a stream or sheet of water is within reach, the cost is but trifling.

An ice house can be constructed

very cheaply after the following fashion: Large posts six or eight inches in diameter may be sunk into the ground to support the frame work forming the walls. For a small ice house two, or, at the most three posts on each side would be sufficient. Inside the posts two inch plank may be nailed on, the posts and the plank completing the walls of the storage.
