Grant, pastor of the Baptist church, Collingwood, performed the ceremony, and the groom's sister, Miss May Blackburn played the wedding march. The bride, who was prettily attired in fawn voile trimmed with white satin, silk chiffon and all-over lace, was attended by her sister Miss Louise Thompson, who was gowned in pale blue voile trimmed with white satin and lace. Mr. G. R. Blackburn, brother of the groom, acted as best man. After the ceremony, an inviting wedding repast was served, the guests being only the immediate relatives of the bride and groom. The bride was the recipient of many beautiful wedding gifts. Mr. and Mrs. Blackburn have settled in their new home east of Rockvale mill and we join their numerous friends in best wishes for a long and happy life together.

The annual meeting of the East Grey Agricultural Society was held in the town hall here on Friday last. The auditor's report showed the receipts for the year to have been \$1187.73, and the disbursements to be as follows: Paid for prizes \$632.80; proportion of County grants to township societies \$178.40; rent and fittings \$27.54; working expenses \$164.04; insurance, etc. \$7.95; secretary's salary \$50; balance on hand \$127. Officers were elected as follows: President Alex. Muir; 1st Vice-President Wesley Buskin; 2nd Vice-Pres. J. A. Boyd; Sec. R. J. Sproule; Directors, E. J. Sproule, J. Stuart, W. Trimble, J. Paton, R. Rathven, J. A. Kernahan, W. J. Meads, D. McTavish, J. I. Graham, Auditors, Jos. Blackburn, W. J. Bellamy.

Mr. John Clinton, who six weeks ago fell on the icy street and broke his thigh bone, succumbed to his injuries on Wednesday morning last week, when he passed away to his eternal rest. The funeral took place to the public cemetery here on Friday afternoon, when an appropriate service was conducted at the house by the Rev. J. S. I. Wilson, who, in closing his address paid a fitting tribute to the memory of the deceased, who had for over fifty years been a faithful member of the Methodist church. Rev. S. Kemp of Maxwell, and Thom. of this place, also took part in the service. The pall-bearers were Wesley Clinton, son; Jos. W. Gamey, and R. Meredith, sons-in-law; John Irwin, nephew; W. C. Hanley and R. J. Sproule, old friends of the deceased. Mr. Clinton was born in the County Fermanagh, Ireland in 1829, and was therefore in his 77th year. In 1849 he was united in marriage to Miss Isabella Dean, also of Fermanagh, who survives him. In 1850, with his young wife, he came to Canada, and for four years lived in the township of Hope, county of Durham. In 1854 he moved to Osprey, and there lived for 44 years, an industrial and prosperous farmer, making a competency for his declining years. Seven years ago he retired here, and was a much respected citizen, deeply interested in all religious and political movements. In the latter, he was an ardent Conservative. The deceased was the father of eleven children, eight of whom survive him, as follows: Joseph, of this village; John, of Edmonton, Alta. Wesley, and William, of Osprey, Mrs. John Smith, Kimberley; Mrs. R. Meldrum, 4th line Artemesia; Mrs. Jos. Gamey, Maxwell; and Isabella, at home. James died at Winnipeg in 1880, George at home in 1888, and an infant was also taken. Mrs. Clinton and family have the sympathy of a large circle of friends in their bereavement.

The special thanksgiving services in the Presbyterian church Sunday, were, notwithstanding the storm and snow-blocked roads, well attended, especially in the evening, when the Methodist congregation kindly withdrew their service. Rev. A. Wilson, of Rosemont, a former pastor, preached with all his old-time vigor and earnestness, touching passages in his sermon moving many in his audience to tears. Mr. Wilson was somewhat reminiscent and was visibly affected with memories of bygone days. At the evening service, Dr. Fred Murray of Toronto assisted the choir, and gave a beautifully rendered solo which was much appreciated by the congregation. Dr. Murray possesses a splendid voice, and fine taste and expression. A tea and entertainment takes place this (Monday) evening, at which the church mortgage will be burned.

UNDER FREE TRADE.

The Canadian trade journal has absolutely no protection from foreign competition. It is even in a worse position than an ordinary unprotected industry. It has to meet the free circulation of foreign publications paid for by foreign manufacturers to exploit this market. Even when foreign periodicals are circulated in a regular way and paid for their larger field and greater facilities enable them to put their subscription price at a figure that compels Canadian journals to issue at practically a loss. Now, under the postal treaty with the United States the Canadian Post Office department carries the tons of papers of this kind that reach Canada weekly free of charge, getting in return the insignificant amount represented by the circulation of Canadian periodicals abroad. At a glance can be seen the disparity between the amount of Canadian publications that can reach the United States, for instance, and those coming into this country from that source. Not only are these American journals a source of expense to this government for carriage and delivery but are beyond the control of our Post Office Department as to contents. It thus happens that they contain advertising and other matter which the Canadian publication is compelled under the regulations to refuse. When it is known that the trade journal with its wide-spread distribution, pays the highest rate of postage exacted under the Postal Act, it will be observed under what disadvantages it carries on its work of education and enlightenment with the trades it represents.—Shoe and Leather Journal.

The Hospital for Sick Children, College Street, Toronto, appeals to the fathers and mothers of Ontario for funds to maintain the thousand sick children that it nurses within its walls every year.

The Hospital is not a local institution—but Provincial. The sick child from any place in Ontario who can't afford to pay has the same privileges as the child living in Toronto and is treated free.

The Hospital had last year in its beds and cot 761 patients, 267 of these were from 196 places outside of Toronto.
