National Portland Cement Company.

The Annual meeting of the Cement Company was held in Toronto on Tuesday. We have no report of the proceedings, but from the financial statement we learn that the year 1904 was much more prosperous than 1903.

The net profits for the year amounted to \$25,804.10. The loss in 1903 was over \$9000. It was also shown in the Secretary's Report to the Directors, that the average price of Cement during 1904 was 58c. a barrel less than in 1903, and had 1903 prices prevailed during 1904 the earnings would have been increased \$102,720.

The mill ran from the 22nd of April to the 22nd of December 1904, a period of eight months continuously. The total output during that time was 187,819 barrels, and the sales amounted to 177,119 barrels. The quality of the cement is excellent and ranks A 1 wherever used.

Additions to the plant amounting to \$9445.16 were made during the year. These were chiefly in connection with the coal-grinding department and were rendered necessary to increase the output of the mill.

Not a single patient has ever been refused admission to the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives because of his or her poverty.

Since the Hospital was opened in April, 1902, nearly 400 patients have been cared for.

Would Have to be Sent Free.

H. J. Pettypiece, M.P.P., Forest, Ont.: "There is a young lad in town, named Kenneth Levitt, aged seven years, showing the very first signs of consumption, and Dr. McCordie, who is attending him, recommends that he be sent to the Sanatorium. He would have to be sent to the Free Hospital, as his mother says she could not pay more than \$1 per week. They asked me to write to you. Do you think he can be admitted?"

No Means to Pay.

L. H. Cascarden, M.D., Douglas, Ont.: "I have a patient in whom pulmonary tuberculosis is just developing, and who has no means of her own to pay for treatment, or at any rate only a small fee in a hospital. I think the treatment at the Sanatorium would help her, and as she has no home I have advised her to seek admission in your institution. Will you kindly send me conditions governing admission?"

A Widow With Small Means.

Mrs. Readwin, Hamilton, Ont.: "I am a widow with one little girl, aged 11 years; my age is 30 years. I am troubled with tuberculosis. I have been doctoring for some time, and my physician has advised me to go to Muskoka. I am not left with very much means, so will you kindly let me know the full particulars, and what is the lowest fees you would charge me a week?"

Ewing, Alliston, Ont.: "While at Gravenhurst the other day I called at the Hospital re a young man named Arthur Armstrong, of this town who was sick with pneumonia about ten or eleven months ago. Since then he has not been able to work. The family are supported by the church and neighbors. What can you do to admit him?"
