ARTISTS' MODELS.

Majority of Those in England Are Respectable and Self-Respecting-Why Art Finds Them a Necessity.

The professional artist's model is the standby. She has not to be sought after, but goes the round the studios in search of engagements, although when she has obtained the reputation of a "Trilby' she sits only for a chosen few.

Keen jealousies are as rampant in the profession of model as in other. The acknowledged "Trilby" holds herself as superior to the common or graden model as a star actress does to a"walker on." She is a connoisseur in figures and does not hesitate to criticize a rival's attractions in merciless and plain-spoken language. Some models are born to the business. Their mother and grandmothers before them knew no other life than that of the studio and their children learn to pose as soon as they can toddle. But this is by no means always the case.
