## AN AMENDMENT PROPOSED TO LICENSE LAW

(Toronto News)  
One of the amendments which it is understood will be made to the license law this session will have the effect of entirely prohibiting the sale of liquor to minors. At present the sale of any kind of spirituous liquor is forbidden to boys or girls under 20, but it is especially enacted that this shall not apply to cases where a minor produces an order from parent, guardian, or master. It has frequently been represented by societies interested in the welfare of children that the exception should not be permitted, as it was just as reprehensible for minors to enter saloons to purchase liquor for others as it would be to acquire it on their own behalf. Another complaint arising out of this practice has been that women are enabled to procure drink by sending their children for it.

Such a change in the law as is proposed is one which, it is believed, will receive the ready assent of every member of the House, and one which will commend itself to the community. At the same time, it will be a proof of the sincerity of the Government in the declaration that the law will be amended where it is defective.

## HIGH GRADE OIL EXISTS.

The Times received a letter on Wednesday from Mr. C. J. Mickle, barrister, of Chesley, president of the Grey and Bruce Oil and Gas Company that operated on the Ormiston farm, which contained interesting information for Owen Sounders. Mr. Mickle stated that the company which is going to operate in this vicinity is the International Oil and Gas Company, Limited of Ingersoll. It is capitalized at \$200,000, par value one dollar per share. The company has leases in Wayne county, Kentucky, and options in the Leamington and Petrolia fields, as well as the holdings at Owen Sound and Sydenham. The company will begin putting its plant here in shape early next month and will commence operations not later than the 10th of April. This information led to the conclusion that the experts who visited the field here a few weeks ago were satisfied that there is a paying field in this vicinity and were willing to take an industrial gamble on further drilling. It was, however, an unanticipated pleasure last night to meet at the Paterson the gentlemen interested in the field, who arrived on the Grand Trunk 10 train. The party consisted of Messrs Arch. Campbell, president, and A. McLaren, director of the International Company, who resides in Detroit; W. T. McMullen, barrister who is a director, and also solicitor of the company, and Mr. J. B. McLaren, director, both of Woodstock; and Mr. Chas. Casson, of Stratford, a large stockholder, and creditor of the Grey and Bruce Company, whose leases the new company takes over. Mr. C. J. Mickle, of Chesley, was also in town, and with Mr. E. P. Rowe and an expert driller. The party went out on the field this morning. President Campbell, who is backing to a large extent the new effort is thoroughly conversant with the work done here. He visited the Ormiston well while it was being sunk, saw the formation, and secured a sample of the product. To the Times he said that the oil taken from the well is the highest grade gas oil known. He has large experience in oil and gas business and in nineteen wells sunk he has only had one that was a non producer in paying quantities. The crude oil procured here is estimated to have a value of over three dollars a barrel and a two barrel Jay well would pay. Standard oil experts agree with him as to the high grade and Mr. Campbell is sanguine as to results. Anyway he is prepared to go ahead sinking wells and will take no six weeks to put one down. He sees no reason why twenty days should not be sufficient to strike the oil bearing sands. The plant here will be put in shape immediately, and work commenced before the 15th Mr. A. P. McLaren, M. P., the big cheese manufacturer, is extensively interested, and will be here this afternoon. The other directors of the company are quite as sanguine as is Mr. Campbell. The creditors of the old company received two thousand shares in the new company and the cheque for three thousand dollars for the plant this morning.—Owen Sound Times
