A meeting of the shareholders of the Imperial Cement Company on Wednesday confirmed the recent decision of the directors to proceed at once to convert the plant into a slurry system.

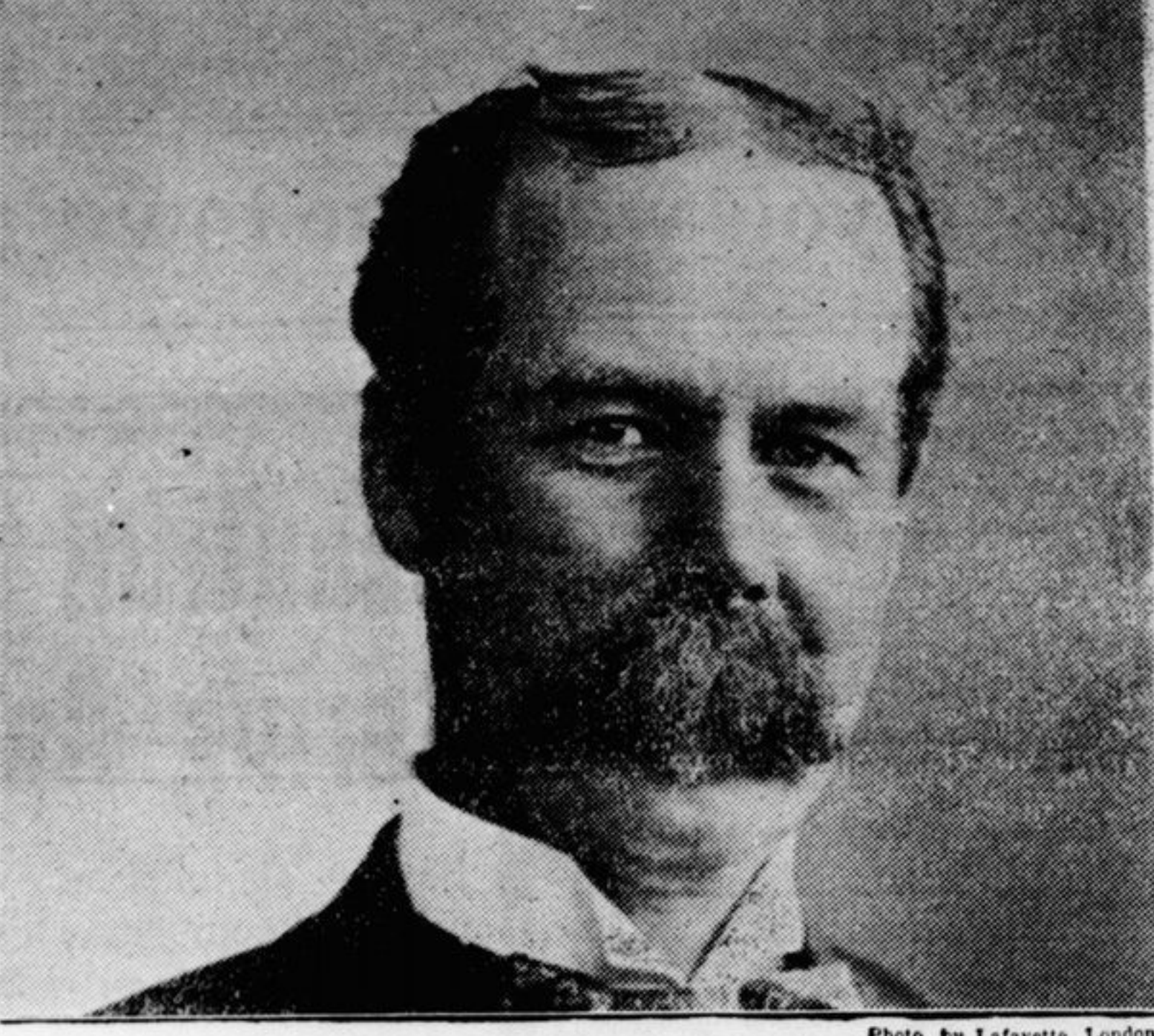
When the factory of the Durham Furniture Co. was burned on 23rd of March, the Company owed the town the sum of \$10,000 which had been guaranteed as a loan.

SIR THOMAS LIPTON The Merchant Prince of England

Bruce county has gone and done it, and the county will now have the reputation of being the most niggardly in Ontario. Thanks to the County Council of 1905. The pistol is being held at the neck of the two school inspectors, and they are being asked to sign an agreement to work for \$5 per school, and if they refuse it is expected that the two-third vote for dismissal will be immediately forthcoming.

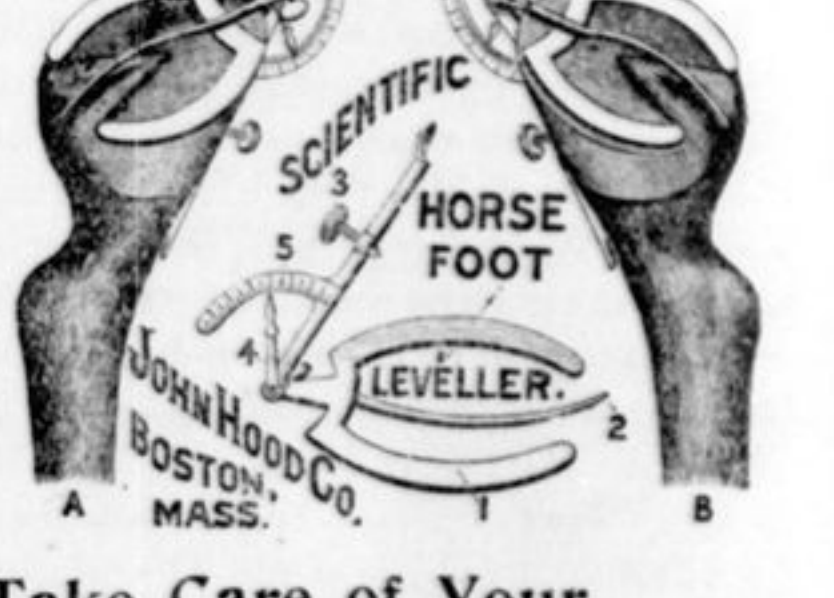

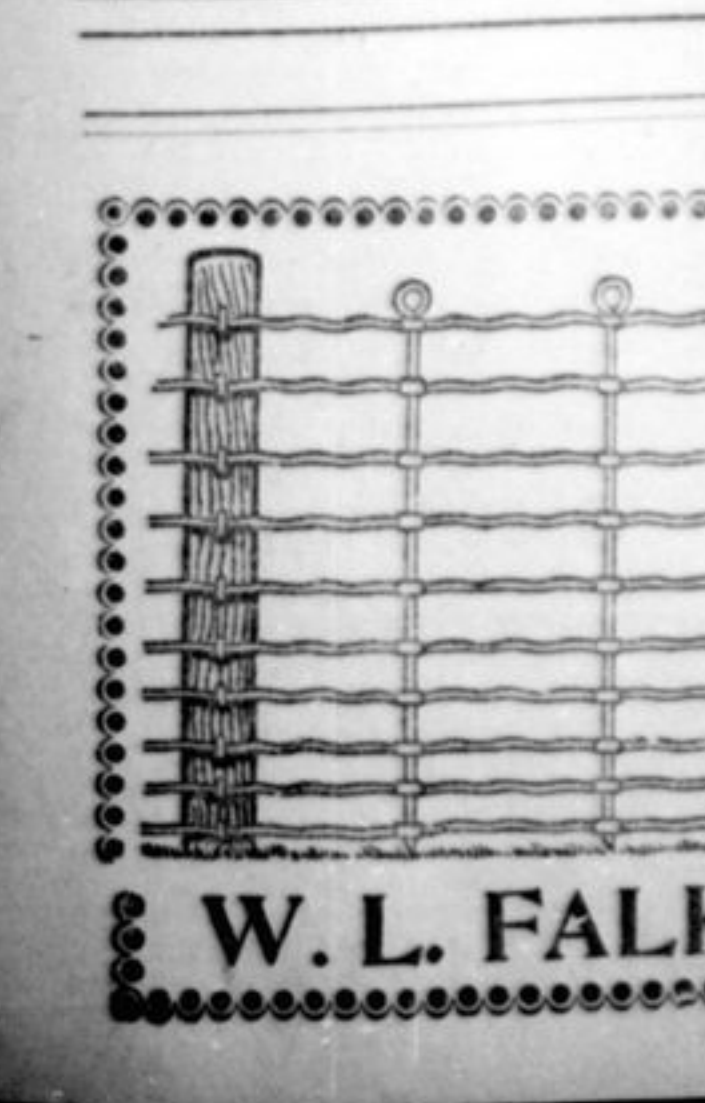
