Met in the Clerk's office, Hanover, on Monday, the 24th day of April, 1905; members all present; the Reeve in the chair; the minutes of February meeting read and passed. Mr. Jacklin, the assessor, handed in the Assessment Roll for the present year which shows:

Total amt of assessment	\$1809,400

By-law No. 5, 1905, fixing the scale
of Statute Labor to be performed un-
der the present year's assessment was
duly passed. The rate of labor in
the by-law is on the same basis as
that in force in past years. Follow-
ing accounts were ordered to be paid,
viz.—W. T. Redford 75c removing
drift wood from bridge; Oliver
McCaslin \$2.50 repairing
bridge on con. 13, lot 19; Edward
Redford \$1.50 filling washout con.
6 and 7; John Reid \$9.60 cutting
brush on Durham Road at lot 12;
G. T. Railway 63 freight on grad-
er repairs; S. B. Wilson & Son \$17.13
for plank; Mun. World \$6.03 asses-
sor's stationery and pathmasters'
lists; Sawyer & Massey \$17 for new
blades for grader; \$100.37 legal and
witness fees and other expenses in
suit for damages Clark vs. the Cor-
poration; the Treasurer was in-
structed to hand over to trustees of
U. S. No. 3, Bentinck and Glenelg,
cheque for \$36 received from
Treasurer of Glenelg re School Arbitra-
tion; the sum of \$300 was ap-
propriated on roads in each of the 4
road divisions of the township; or-
dered that the grant of \$5 quarterly
to the late John Smith be continued
to his widow. Council adjourned.

The council met April 16, pur-
suant to adjournment. Members
present.—Thos. McFadden, Reeve;
Wm. Wier, Geo. E. Arrowsmith, E.
W. Hunt, Councillors. Minutes of
last meeting read and confirmed.
Communications read as follows:—
From "Good Roads Machinery Co.,
several communications and circular;
K. W. McKay, re meeting of Municipal
Officers; A. W. Campbell, re im-
provement of roads; R. Matthews, re
Deaf and Dumb Institute; Regis-
tration of South Grey, account for
searches; A. Davidson, re Cement
Tiles; J. A. McMillan, regretting his
inability to attend the meeting; D. R.
Wilkie, re South African Memorial;
City Clerk of Toronto, relating to
giving married women owning
property votes.
Mr. Scott of the Good Roads Co.
addressed the meeting at some
length.
By-law 451, relating to statute
labor was introduced and read a first
and second time.
Arrowsmith—Weir—That John
Wilson be paid \$2.50 for repair of
culvert at lot 11, con. 10, also Sam
Wright \$2 for repair of road and
Morrow Hill. Carried.
Weir—Hunt—That A. McLachlin
and D. Sinclair be paid \$4 for remov-
ing ice and timber from bridge at
sideroad 40, con. 2 N. D. R., and
that D. Sinclair be paid \$12.25 to pay
men for building culvert and repair
of road at lot 47, con. 3 N. D. R. Car-
ried.
Weir—Hunt—Geo. Arrowsmith be
paid \$1. overseeing road, Ward 3 C.
Arrowsmith—Hunt—That Reeve,
Mr. Weir and Mr. Davis be paid \$1
each for removing ice and timber
jam from bridge at lot 1, con. 2 N.
D. R. Carried.
Arrowsmith—Hunt—That the ac-
count of John Chapman, for coffin
and burial of Mrs. Dillon, amounting
to \$12, be paid. Carried.
Hunt—Weir—That the Reeve,
Mr. Arrowsmith and Mr. Hunt be a
committee to ascertain the cost of
buying a road on the Hamilton or
Walker farms, and also to find out
what the old road can be sold for,
and report at next meeting, and that
they be authorized to buy if they
see fit. Carried.
Weir—Hunt—That the Treasurer
be paid \$1.85 for postage, etc. Car-
ried.
Weir—Arrowsmith—That the
assessor be paid \$40 on salary. Car-
ried.
Other payments were made as
follows: Thos. Lauder, Registration
searches, 75c; Municipal World,
for copy of statutes, 1903, 90c; The
reeve, inspecting bridge and other
business, \$2.
Weir—Arrowsmith—That this
council is in favor of having sec 606
of the Municipal Act amended, by
substituting therefor the following:
606.—"Every public road, or street
bridge and highway shall be kept in
repair by the corporation, and in de-
fault of corporation doing so shall
be liable to any punishment provided
by law." and that the clerk send a
copy of this resolution to Dr. Jamie-
son, for submitting to Municipal
Committee of the Legislature. Car-
ried.
The Reeve, Clerk and Mr. Arrow-
smith were appointed a committee to
meet a committee of Holland coun-
cil re "Walker deviation."
By-law 451 respecting statute labor
was passed. The clerk was instruct-
ed to strike of one day statute labor
for T. C. McGirr, for work performed
in 1904.
The council adjourned.
