THE Methodist Choir went to Varney on Tuesday evening last, and according to the racket made coming home, must have enjoyed themselves.

THE residence of the late H. Parker has been bought by the Presbyterian church for a manse. Evidently, the Presbyterians have confidence that Presbyter and Anglica will live side by side in peace and harmony.

BY mutual consent, it has been arranged by Presbyterians on both sides of the Atlantic, that Sunday, the 21st of June, be set apart as a day to call to mind, John Knox, the intrepid reformer.
