### Egremont Council.

Council met May 29th. Minutes approved. Comr. Robb reported road improvements in his Div. amounting to \$5.50.

Gordon—Ferguson—That foregoing report be adopted and Comr. be paid 50cts. Comn. fees.—Carried. Reeve reported road improvements in his Div. amounting to \$10.00

Robb—McArthur—That reeve report be adopted and he receive \$2. Comr. fees.—Carried.

The reeve reported on the disposal of the goods of the late Duncan McLachlan an inmate of the House of Refuge from Egremont. His personal effects were on the valuation of Mr. Harkness not sufficient to pay freight charges, so no action was taken regarding them.

He visited Mr. Pride, Proton, where his tools were supposed to be and disposed of them to Mr. Pride for \$5.00 which was paid into the Treasurer.

Robb—Gordon—That foregoing report be adopted and the reeve be paid \$2. for his services.—Carried. Comr. McArthur reported on road improvements in his Div. amounting to \$7.00.

Ferguson—Gordon—That said report be adopted, and Comr. be paid 50cts. fees.—Carried. Comr. Gordon reported road improvements in his Div. amounting to \$17.50.

Gordon—McArthur—That the foregoing report be adopted and Comr. be paid 50cts. Comr. fees.—Carried. The reeve and Comr. Ferguson reported on tile manufacture. They engaged R. Christie to make the tile at \$2. per day, he, to render an account of his time and other expenses. The work has begun and an expenditure of \$40.68 to date. We recommend that sufficient moulds be got to keep the work going on steadily.

Robb—McArthur—That the report on tile be adopted and that the Clerk order another 10 in. and 16 in. moulds from same Co. Hamilton.—Carried.

By-Law No. 187 to provide a new scale for statute labor passed. The usual readings etc.

The reeve with the reeve and Clerk of Arthur met and examined accounts and pathrolls on townline, and found that Egremont had expended \$49.80. more on townline, and than Arthur. Ferguson—Gordon—That J. Reid be paid \$5.00 for boarding W. Romain for two weeks after returning from the House of Refuge.—Carried.

Ferguson—McArthur—That an order be drawn for \$16.50 expenses re committal Wm. Romain.—Carried. Resolved that the following be paid:

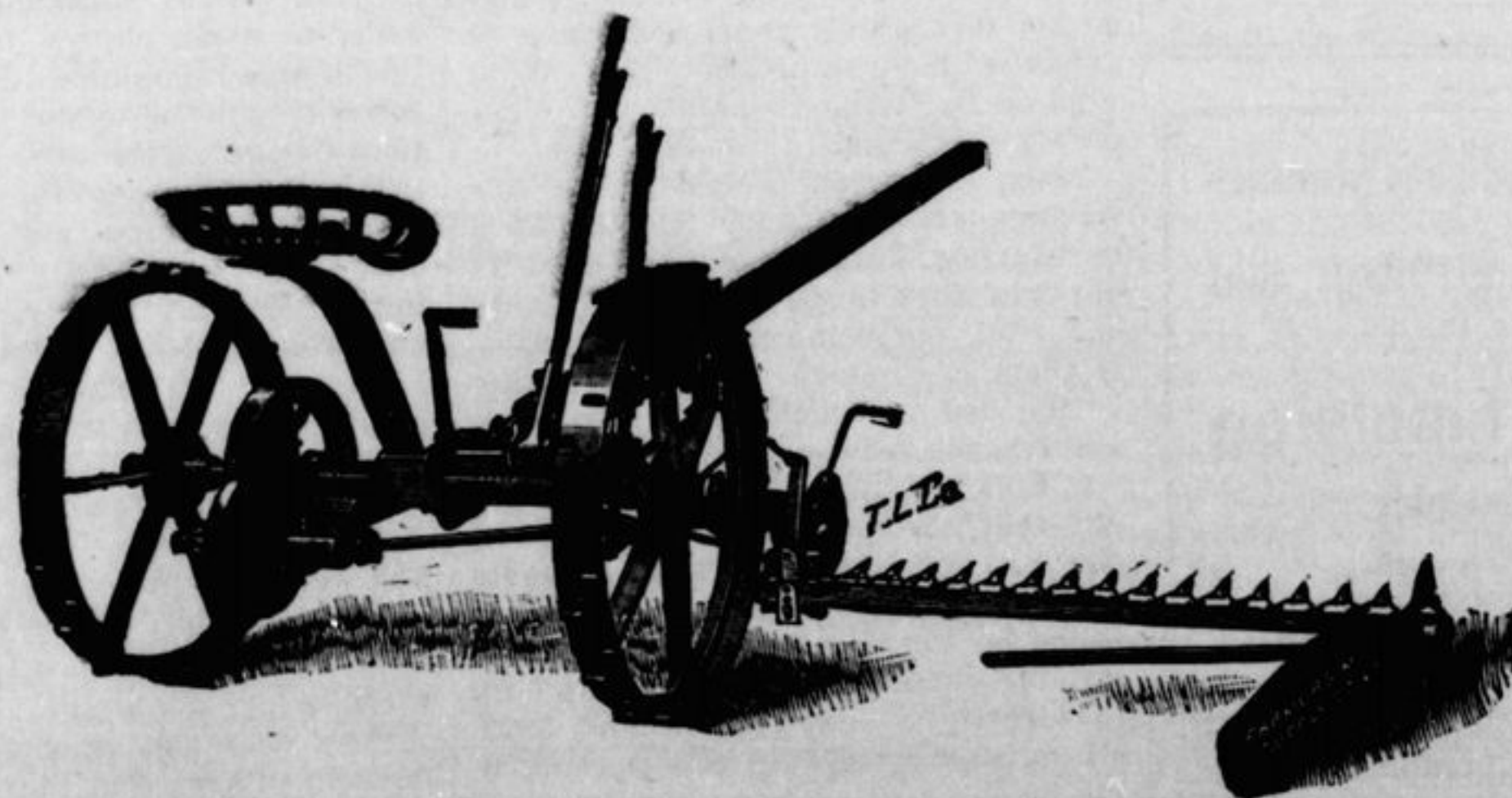
