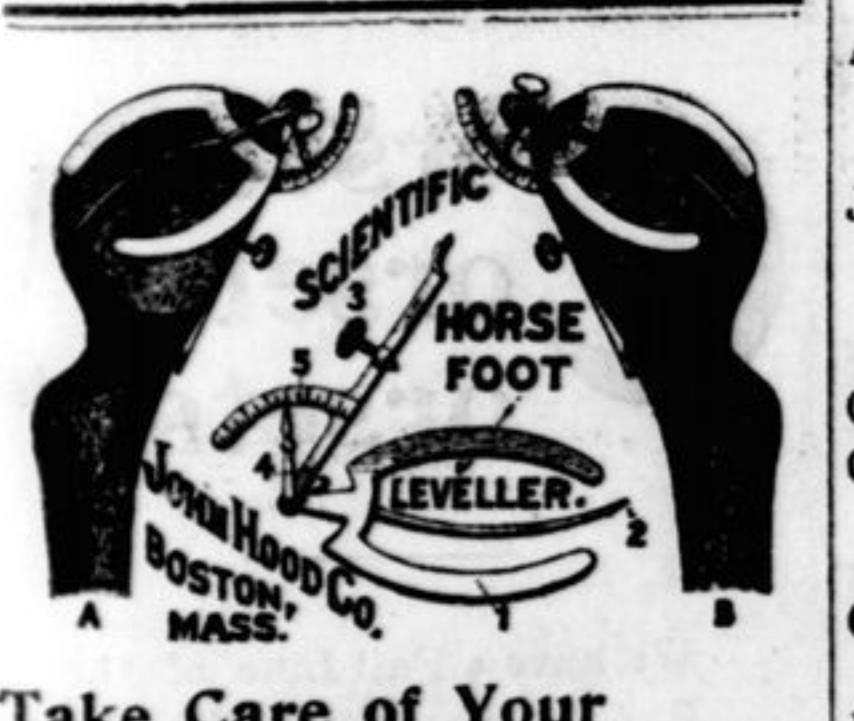

Another C. P. R. Projection

It begins to look as though the dream of the good people of Southampton for connection with the C. P. R. may realize and that the big corporation have an eye on that town as another outlet on Lake Huron. Within the past week a C. P. R. "promoter" named Savage has been conducting an investigation at different points along proposed routes from Chatsworth to Southampton, and has been interviewing the authorities and business and manufacturers with respect to the extent of shipping. The proposed line would be a branch of the Owen Sound division of the C. P. R. and Chatsworth, it is said will be the junction point. Two routes are in view. One via Keady, Tara, Bargoine, Port Elgin to Southampton. The other is supposed to be via Desboro, Chesley, Gilbes Hill and Port Elgin to Southampton. The former route is 24 miles in length, and 12 miles shorter than the Chesley route
