Flesherton.

J. Freethy, of Sunnidale. Rev. W. T. Allison pastor of the Presbyterian church, Stayner, performed the ceremony. The bride's cousin Miss Ethel E. Blackburn, of Creemore, played the Wedding March. The bride who was given by her father, was prettily attired in a brown skirt and white satin blouse trimmed with lace and applique. The bride's sister Miss Eliza J. Blackburn, was bridesmaid, and wore a brown cloth skirt with white silk blouse trimmed with lace. Mr. A. Freethy, the groom's brother, was best man.

After the ceremony a dainty wedding supper was served and a season of much pleasure was spent before the young couple left for their own home. A large number of beautiful wedding presents were bestowed upon the very highly esteemed young bride. About eighty guests, near relatives of the bride and groom, were present from Collingwood, Creemore, Maxwell, Flesherton, Port Law, and Dobbinton.
