A TIN CUP TRICK.

Do it cleverly and you can pose as a Magician.

This little trick, performed in a parlor, will make you appear quite a magician.

Get beforehand two perfectly plain tin cups without handles and with the bottom sunk about a quarter of an inch and straight sides. On the sunk bottom of each put some glue and over it draw some bird's seed, so that it looks as if the cup were full, whereas it is really standing upside down and the top of nest is glued to the outside bottom.

When you are ready to perform the trick hold a bag of the same kind of seed in your right hand, and with your left hand hold the cup upside down and allow the seed to fall into it.

Turn it upside down, and the seed will take it out the bottom, and you will think it is full.

Place the apparently full cup of seed under a hat, but in doing so, turn it so that the empty cup is on the right and the glued side at the bottom. Don't let your audience see this.

Now take the other cup, which is empty and let them see you put it under another hat, but also turn it so that they do not see you put the seed to the top and bottom, as if the cup were full, and when you remove the hat after pronouncing some

magic words it will look as if the cup had changed places.

Remove the cups before any one has a chance to examine them.—New York Mail.

The housekeeper who is often dismayed on discovering that the roasting chicken she ordered sent home from her butcher's is a fowl of mature years and as she thinks far too tough to be roasted may transform this same aged fowl into a chicken roasted into toothsome tenderness.

Let her truss her fowl as usual and then fold it completely in two thicknesses of wrapping paper, securely fastening the paper with string.

The fowl may now be put in the oven and roasted three-fourths of an hour.

At the end of that time the paper is removed and the chicken returned to the oven and roasted as long as would have been necessary had it been tender in the beginning.

It must be basted often and turned occasionally.

NAMES OF EXPRESS TRAINS.

Terms That Impress Themselves Upon the Public.

Some time ago a railroad company offered a substantial prize for the most attractive title for its fastest train, and though none of those submitted was accepted the ingenuity of the competitors was not undeserving of praise. Among those sent in were such titles as the Republican Limited, the Narrow Path express, the Liberty express, the Yankee High Flier and many others more or less good, says the Detroit News-Tribune. Although the novel competition practically failed in its purpose, it called attention to the picturesque and ingenious names which designate many of the important high fliers which run daily over American rails. There is no better known express in the world than the Twentieth Century Limited, which runs with but a single stop between New York and Chicago in twenty hours. The title in this instance is a particularly happy one, for it not only symbolizes the century in which we live, but also the actual time occupied in the run.

Another interesting and appropriate name belongs to an express which runs daily from Philadelphia to New York and which is known as the Brides' Limited. This high flier gained its name from the fact that ever since its inauguration last year it has not failed to carry at least one happy couple on a honeymoon trip daily. The Brides' Limited is made up of three or four Pullman coaches, each bearing some title suggestive of its happy freight, such as Cupid, Hymen, etc., and the train is now extremely popular with newly married couples.

The Green Mountain Flier is the famous Montreal express for New York and received its name from the beautiful green hills through which it runs on its daily journeys. An equally picturesque title is that of the Sunset Limited, a Southern Pacific express, which dashes daily toward that El Dorado of horticulturists—California.

Minneapolis and St. Paul are known as the Twin Cities, and so it is only natural that the train which runs from there to St. Louis should be called the Twin City Limited. The exposition at St. Louis, by the way, has been the means of giving titles to many new trains, among these being the Exposition Limited, over the Grand Central.

One of the most magnificent trains in the world is the High Grass Limited, which runs from St. Paul to the Pacific coast, so called because in its journey it passes over much desolate prairie. This train is one of the longest for passenger express service in the country, consisting, as it does, of thirteen cars, each averaging eighty feet in length.

Western Hemlock.

The introduction of western hemlock to the market as a building material has met with many obstacles. The hemlock of the east is far inferior to the western species as a building wood, and the prejudice existing against the eastern species is unjustly extended to that of the west. The latter is a hard, straight and even grained wood, nearly white in color. It does not split readily and is light and tough. These characteristics peculiarly fit it for manufacture into boxes. It is also a superior wood for all inside finishing, as it takes a high polish and has excellent wearing qualities. It can be rapidly kiln dried at high temperature without injury. Mechanical tests have shown it to possess about 70 per cent of the strength of red fir and to be suited for all except the heaviest structural demands. Large quantities of this timber are now sold under other names than its own. There is no just cause for the prejudice which necessitates this deception, and western hemlock should be handled under its right name.—Department of Agriculture Bulletin.
