

Saugeen Presbytery

The Presbytery of Saugeen met on

Tuesday of last week in Knox Church! Harriston, the Rev. Mr. Hanna, the Moderator in the chair. The attennce was smaller than usual partly *ccounted for by the absence of Messrs. Cameron and Young in the North West and of Mr. Little at the World's Convention of Young People's Societies at Baltimore. The Clerk's place was taken by Mr. Tate, of Rothsay, and the business of the day was passed through expeditiously and pleasantly. At the request of the Ayton congregation steps were taken to elect elders at that station and an interim session consisting of Messrs. Drummond and Campbell of Clifford, and Grant of Durham, with Mr. Farquharson as Moderator was appointed.

The Durham congregation was congratulated on the step they had taken in the purchase of a Manse and liberty was given them to borrow on the sccurity of the property a sum not exceeding \$2500.

Reports from the Home Mission Committee and Young People's Societies was passed through and a list of committees was struck to take charge of the several departments of work for the next two years and Presbytery adjourned to meet in Durham on the 26th of September next.
