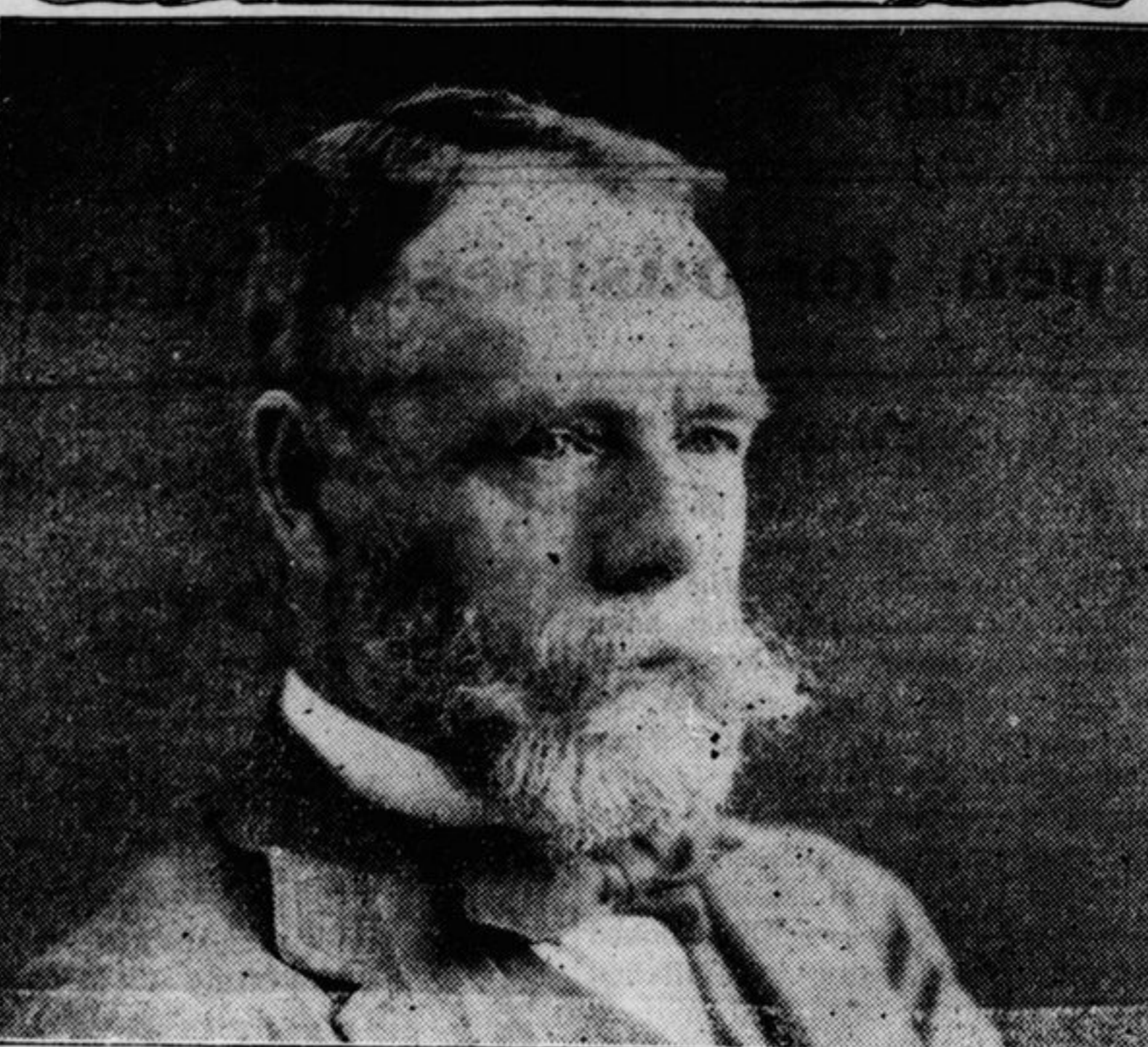

LORD MOUNT STEPHEN The Career of a Great Canadian

The greatest philanthropist of Canada is Lord Mount Stephen; the greatest benefactor of the United States is Andrew Carnegie—both men who came to the new world as poor boys from the east of Scotland.

When George Stephen, the son of a poor carpenter in the small Scotch village of Duftown was born in 1829, the outlook for a great success seemed surely dim and improbable.

In Canada he found his cousin, Donald Smith, later Lord Strathcona, and the two Highlanders who had played together as boys, joined issues, and soon, like the meeting of two brooks, their united efforts flowed in one channel.

When British Columbia entered the Dominion it was with the understanding that the Government would build a railroad across the continent. The Government failed sadly in its plans; in 1880, one year before the entire road should have been ready.
