Arrested for Horse Stealing.

Before dawn yesterday morning
James Wells was awakened out of
sleep in a house on the tenth of Min-
to and placed under arrest by Chief
Treadwell for horse stealing. Wells
is an Englishman who came out from
the old country with his family this
summer and located first in George
town. He was a brickmaker by trade
and moved to Durham a few weeks
ago to work in the brickyard there.
It is said, that he got in debt, and
decided to come down in this direc-
tion and hired a horse and buggy
from liverman Calwell for that pur-
pose, paying two dollars in advance.
But he kept the horse too long and
Mr. Calwell got after him. He was
located in a horse on the tenth of
Minto opposite Mr. Henry Harvey's,
the other effects having been brought
down by the G. T. R. on Tuesday by
train. Mr. Calwell and Chief Tread-
well left here after midnight yester-
day morning and effected the arrest
recovering horse and rig in which
they went to Durham in the fore-
noon. There Wells will undergo
trial before a magistrate. The Chief
informs us that the case is rather a
pitiable one. The wife and three
children had only two potatoes in
the house for food when he was there
and he thinks that Wells is an inno-
cent sort of a fellow, who did not
mean anything seriously wrong.
The Chief, however, has notification
of 32 cases of horse-stealing in the
Province in his possession and it
will not do to treat such a crime
leniently.—Confederate.

Robbed in a Lonely Bush.

Anthony Josef, a Syrian lad 13
years of age, was equipped with a
pedlar's kit this week and placed on
the road to financial independence.
He was surrounded by a crowd of
jeering men near Pacific Hotel when
a man drove up in a buggy and
volunteered to take the little fellow
away from his tormentors—and
thereby hangs a tale.
Yesterday morning Joseph Fellen-
er appeared in the police court on the
charge of being the man who posed
as the lad's benefactor. A mighty
host of Syrians were in the police
court and their evidence was in effect,
as follows: The youthful pedlar had
willingly accepted the man's offer to
be driven away from those who were
poking fun at him. The driver of
the buggy then drove directly to
Day's Hotel, Sydenham, and there
turned toward the lake shore road.
At a lonely sylvan spot the man
stopped and led the unsuspecting boy
into an adjoining bush. He seized
him by the throat and threw him on
the ground, after which he searched
his pockets and secured \$5. The
lad's kit was then opened and
two "gold" coins, a pocket knife
and other articles were taken. The
amateur highwayman then instruct-
ed the boy to remain in the bush
until he should go and bring two
men to take him back to Owen Sound.
But he did not occur—nor did the
two men. The Syrian boy enquired
at a neighboring farm house as to his
whereabouts and ultimately reached
home.

The prisoner did not enter a plea
yesterday morning but his solicitor,
Mr. C. S. Cameron, asked for a
remand. Accordingly Police Magis-
trate Cressor remanded him until
next Wednesday.—Owen Sound Sun
