FRUIT CROP REPORT.

The conditions are practically unchanged since the July report. The weather has been on the whole most favorable. A few windstorms have been reported, but the effects have been local and not in the large commercial orchards. Insects are slightly more numerous than last year, especially the Codlin moth and San Jose Scale: fungous disease have not developed abnormally during the month.

The feature of the month is the apple reports. The crop is now so far advanced that a fair estimate can be made of the crop, the most serious disturbing factor being the usual September windstorms which have yet to be reckoned with.

The Southern Ontario (Lake Erie) District will give a very light crop of winter apples. Three fourths of the orchards have reported a total failure iu early and fall varieties.

The Lake Huron District and central counties east to York will give a light to medium crop with very many more than enough for local use. Some fall apples will be available for shipping purposes.

The Lake Ontario District will show a medium crop of good fruit. Ben Davis. Russets and Spys showing in few cases a full crop. The early and fall apples are relatively a better crop than the winter fruit.

The St Lawrence and Ottawa Val leys, Montreal Island and Eastern Townships will yield a medium crop of Faneuse, Alexanders and Wealthys, with a very light crop of winter fruit.

The Nova Scotia crop will be light and somewhat scattered, Kings, Russets and Ben Davis are yielding better even than the Bellflower and Gravenstein, the latter being particularly short.

Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick both report a light crop, and the latter will import winter fruit.

British Columbia will be the only Province giving a medium to full crop. There is some complaint of fungous diseases in certain parts of the Province, but in the main the apples will be bright and clean; the aggregate, however, is too small to have any effect on the markets.

The Dominion, as a whole, will produce about one third as many apples as last year, but the fruit will te freer from scab but somewhat more infested with Codlin moth. There is also a general concensus of opinion that the present favorable weather conditions and light crop will cause the apples now on the trees to fill out much better than usual. It is also certain that much justify.



ALEXANDER GRAHAM BELL The Inventor of the Telephone

Alexander Graham Bell, the inventor of the telephone, comes from a family that has made a special study of sound and speech for three genera- and it did me good in a few days, tions. His grandfather, Alexander Bell, invented a method for removing impediments of speech; his father, Alexander Melville Bell, was the inventor of "visible speech," a system to teach deaf-mutes to speak; and the third of the Alexanders, really "Alexander the Great" of his family, taught a piece of wire to carry the human voice many miles and deliver the message without a change.

He was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1847, and after receiving his education at the High School and the University of his native town, went to London at the age of twenty to attend the University, but left on account of ill health, and in 1870 came to Canada with his father. Two years later he went to Boston, where he introduced his father's system of teaching the deaf, and supported himself by private classes. But the broader field of science attracted him most; in England and Canada he had carried on experiments in multiplex telegraphy which grew more fascinating as he proceeded, and in Boston he interested two wealthy men who supplied funds for his experiments; but he had to teach by day for his own support.

In 1874 came the first faint elusive germ of the telephone; it seemed such a will-o'-the-wisp to his partners that they would not listen to it; they were practical men with no time for such dreams. In 1875, after completing his multiplex telegraphy, he went to Washington and found his application for a patent had been contested by Elisha Gray, the great scientist. He was in despair, but while talking to Professor Henry, he mentioned his theory of sending sound by telegraph, and the few kindly words of encouragement he received, breathed into him new life and purpose.

He returned to Boston with a giant's energy but an almost empty purse. To complicate the situation he had fallen in love with Miss Hubbard, daughter of his friend and benefactor, and had a feeling of delicacy about asking the father of his fiancée for a loan. So in desperation he renewed the struggle, and in June, 1875, almost by accident, stumbled on a clew that solved the problem. On February 14th, 1876, he filed his application for a patent; one hour later Elisha Gray filed a caveat on precisely the same plan, and on March 7th, 1876, Mr. Bell received his patent; it was number 174,465, one of the most important ever allowed in the history of America. Entered according to Act of the Parliament of Canada, in the year 1905, by W. C. Mack, at the Department of Agricultures.


