

Ontario Sunday School Association.

The 40th Annual Convention of the Ontario Sunday School Association, to be held in the City of London, October 24th, 25th and 26th, promises to be of more than usual interest. Situated in the heart of a district exceptionally strong in Sunday School activity, in a city of handsome churches, model Sunday Schools, hospitable homes, and excellent rail road facilities, the prospects were never more hopeful. The program, which is now being issued, includes the names of a number of Canadian specialists, and in addition to Mrs. Lamoreaux, a noted Primary worker from Chicago, and Marion Lawrence, the International Secretary, from Toledo, Ohio. Seven open parliaments and conferences have been arranged, and will undoubtedly prove an attractive feature, and will embrace Primary work, Teacher work, Home Department, House to House Visitation, Parents' Responsibility, and Decision Day. House to House Visitation will no doubt receive special consideration, in view of the interest connected with the movement. During this present year, Visitations have taken place in Hamilton, London, Belleville, Sarnia, Dundas and Deseronto, with the most gratifying results, and it is expected that similar movements will be undertaken in Kingston, Woodstock, Eglinton, Pembroke, Port Hope, Berlin, Waterloo, the Township of Windham, in Norfolk County and Toronto, in the near future. Teacher Training will also receive special attention, in view of the fact that this is the first year the department has had a secretary. He has already visited some 38 counties, organized 40 classes with an enrollment approximating nearly 700 students.

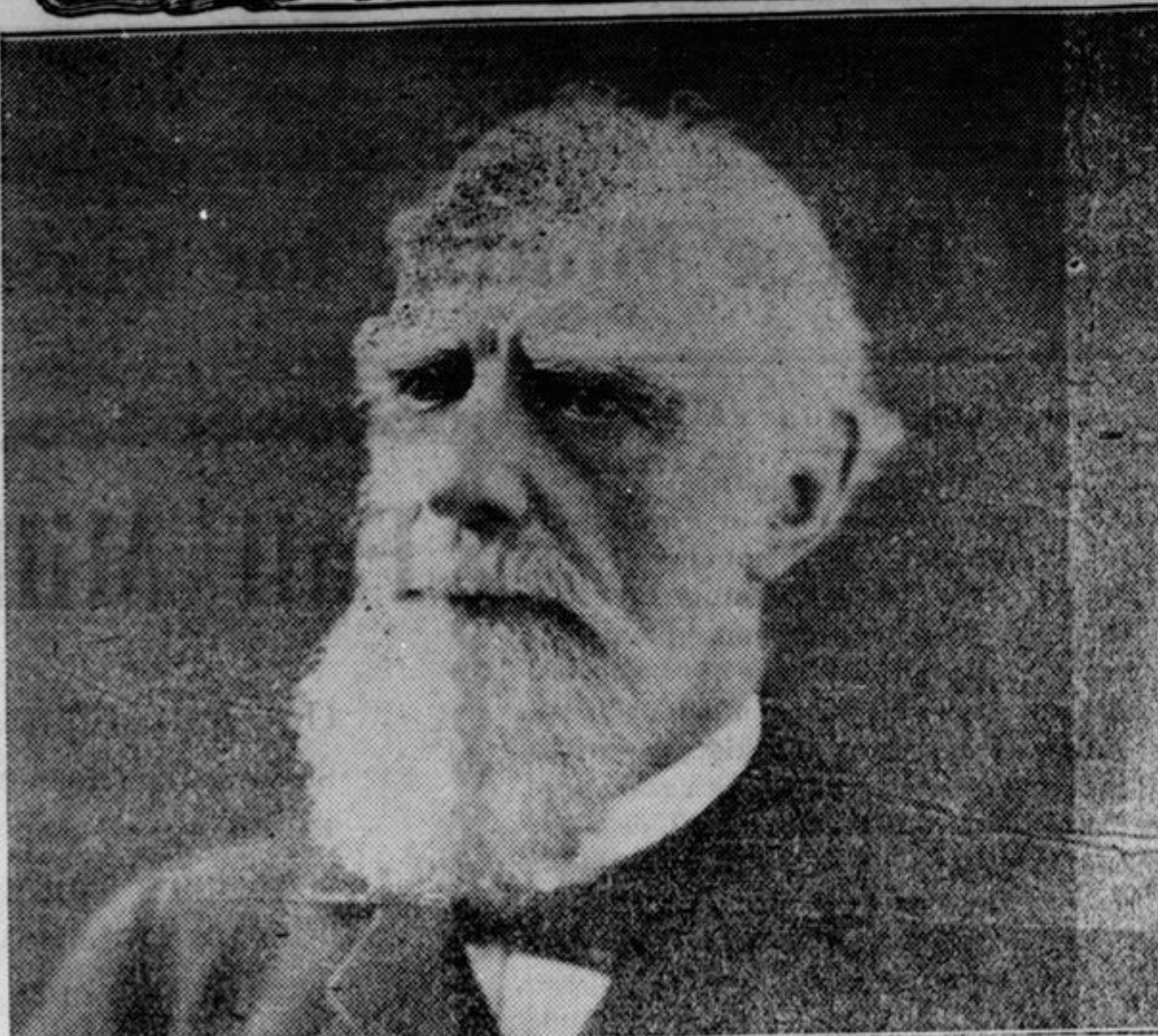

LORD STRATHCONA

Canadian High Commissioner to London
In 1838 a young Scotch boy of eighteen, named Donald A. Smith, entered the service of the Hudson Bay Co. He had been educated for the Civil Service in India; but the sturdy life of hardship, the rigorous, close-hand-to-hand battle with fate, somehow appealed to him more than the easier and more enervating life of the Orient.

For thirteen years he labored on the hard Labrador coast, where the climate was inhuman, the monotony insurmountable, the loneliness appalling, and promotion seemed slower than the movement of a glacier. But young Smith made his record, and in this rough training-school learned self-reliance, courage, self-conquest, prudence, and shrewdness among the solitudes, and a sureness of judgment. He learned to conquer obstacles and to laugh in triumph at them. In 1869 he had gradually risen to the post of resident-governor—the supreme possibility under the Hudson Bay Co.

When the Federation decided to take over the title of the company, they met an obstacle in the opposition of the Metis, the halfbreeds of the plains, who rose in rebellion under the leadership of the fanatic Louis Rell. In this extremity Donald Smith was recognized, and his courage, tact and wisdom aided in cutting the Gordian knot of disagreement. He at once became the most powerful man of the Northwest, and a year later was elected to the House of Commons. Then came the fierce battle against the corruption, bribery, and Governmental incompetency in building the great railroad connecting the oceans, and later the organizing of the company, headed by Mr. Smith (the future Lord Strathcona) and his cousin, Lord Mount Stephen, that built the magnificent railroad on the ruins of the Government's hopeless failure. Lord Strathcona's financial ability, his organizing power, his genius for inspiring others to see and to realize his visions, carried the day; and as to his own success in early railroad building is due to Lord Strathcona. He received his first imperial honor as financier, statesman, philanthropist, and in various other fields he has been pre-eminent, and like all really great men has retained his simplicity through it all. To-day, at the age of seventy-five, he is Canadian High Commissioner in London, a most exacting position, and his marvelous knowledge of Canadian affairs and his other unique qualities would make it impossible to replace him.

The adopted father and Mrs. Batte, who were examined as witnesses, said the girl stated she did not know why she had done as she did, and could not themselves offer any reason as there appeared no illfeeling and they admitted the girl was cheerful and willing. The prisoner came before Judge Barrett on Monday and the Judge reserved decision.—Bruce Herald.

ABOUT SLEIGH RUNNERS.

Here's an amendment from the Ontario Statutes of 1905 which may interest you, even if you are not doing any sleighing.

(1)—On and after the coming into force of this section no person shall use on any public highway except within the limits of any city, any sleigh or other vehicle upon runners drawn by horses or other animals (except cutters) manufactured after the 1st day December, 1906, unless the same is constructed that the distance between the outer edges of such runners at the bottom is not less than four feet.

(2)—This section shall be given effect to, notwithstanding any by-law or bylaws that may have been passed by the council of any county under paragraph number 6 of section 559 of The Consolidated Municipal Act, 1903; provided that the council may pass a bylaw exempting such county from the operation of this Act.

(3)—Any person guilty of violating the provisions of this section shall upon conviction for every such violation, be liable to a penalty of not more than \$10 nor less than \$5, to be recoverable with costs under the provisions of the Ontario Summary Convictions Act.

Drs. Stewart and Gillies were sent for and it was thought best to amputate the limb between the elbow and shoulder. ILLUSTRATION FAIRS

All the agricultural societies of the Province, including those in county have been written to by H. B. Cowd, Provincial Superintendent of Agricultural Societies, urged to appoint delegates to attend either the Beachburg exhibition North Renfrew, on October 5 & 6, the Simcoe exhibition in North County, October 18 & 19.

These are two of the very purely agricultural societies in Province. They both have splendid grounds and buildings, the equal any in the Province, and the grounds and buildings are practically all for. The annual report of the North Renfrew society for 1904 shows that its buildings are worth \$13,000, its lands \$3,000, total \$16,000, liabilities of only \$400. The report of the Norfolk Union Society shows that its lands are worth \$3,000, buildings \$9,500, total \$12,500, mortgage of only \$600. The Ontario Department of Agriculture is arranging for a convention of representatives from the other agricultural societies in the Province at these exhibitions. Reduced rates are being secured over the railroads, particulars of which will be sent your society later. It is expected that delegates will be able to attend at half rates.

The Department believes that time is coming when there will be a material reduction in the number of societies in the Province and instead of holding so many exhibitions, fewer and larger exhibitions will be held. This makes it possible to arrange the exhibitions into circuits and for various educational institutions in the country to prepare special exhibits to take from one exhibition to another. To illustrate what is done in this direction the Department is arranging to have many educational features at both of these exhibitions. Delegates who will be able to gain information the cost of introducing these features and as to the best methods of conducting them at their exhibition. The evening of the first day of the exhibition will be when an opportunity will be given them to discuss the various features of the exhibition and other matters relating to the management of the

The special features of the exhibitions will include:—
1. Demonstrations in the work department under the direct Mr. G. A. Putnam, Superintendent of Ontario Womens' Institutes.
2. Live stock judging competitions for farmers' sons.
3. A special exhibit prepared by Mr. F. C. Elford, Chief of Poultry Division of the Department of Agriculture, illustrating desirable and undesirable methods of birds for fattening purposes, showing a model poultry fattening crates, packing methods of packing trap nets,
