FINDS LOOPHOLES IN CANADA'S LAW.

J. B. McKenzie now Thinks the Hanging of Martin Was Judicial Murder.

Mr. J. B. Mackenzie, the lawyer who has found so many flaws and faults in the laws of Ontario and Canada, in particular regarding the Alien Labor Act, has made another astonishing discovery in connection with his claim that the Ontario Government has no jurisdiction in the sale of liquor on the Great Lakes.

"If my connection is correct, then it follows that the hanging of Alexander Martin, in the yard of Toronto jail a few months ago, was a judicial murder," said Mr. Mackenzie this morning. The lawyer's claim is that all power and authority in regard to crimes or happenings on water is vested in the Admiralty Court, and that the other courts of the country have no jurisdiction. The Admiralty Act, he asserts, provides that that court shall have jurisdiction over the crews of ships in Canadian waters, and it defines the word ship as meaning any boat except one propelled by oars. This leaves a loop-hole, according to Mr. Mackenzie, in the Martin case, where the crime was supposed to have been committed in the boat.

The case in which the matter of the boat Greyhound is accused of selling liquor without license is to be heard in the High Court at Osgoode Hall next Tuesday
