NO SCARCITY OF MARL YET.

of \$7,000 a month has also been met, and above and beyond this there are the necessary outlays for coal, oil, repairs, etc., etc., items we have no way of figuring on. We are told however, on good authority that the coal bill for a year will run up to \$50,000.

"Marl running out" is the cry. This is nothing but a bit of wind. Borings are being made now and in the very first test the augur was put down through twenty-four feet of solid marl of what appeared to be excellent quality and the borers tell us they hadn't reached the bottom then. This boring was made only a few rods from the Company's property and there are acres of it right there varying from five to twenty-four in depth. There is absolutely no danger of the marl becoming exhausted during the next hundred years. This was the song we sang during the promotion period, and from subsequent investigations we can sing it now louder than ever.

From reports of marl to be found in Wilder's Lake, the lake now being used, the expert examination revealed enough to last for at least the present generation in that little body of water alone. Some of our own men were present and did the boring at the time. They still live and still claim that great depths of marl were to be found there, but the officials here claim otherwise notwithstanding the enormous success of the mill during the year just drawing to a close.

In addition to payments of debt specified above the Company also paid out of this year's work, a loan of \$13,000 they got from the bank to keep them running during the early part of the season. Surely this is a good season's record and were we so favored next year there are strong signs of a ten per cent. dividend for each and every shareholder. The \$110,000 of actual profits shown above should have gone into the pockets this year of the stockholders were it not for the debt to be paid on the mill. This on a plant capitalized at \$1,000,000 would be 11%.

There are good reasons for shareholders in Durham to have grave suspicions regarding the scarcity of marl in Wilder's Lake and if the advice, to drain the lake given by Mr. Cochran in another column be put into effect they will no doubt find to their astonishment that they have only reached the loose stuff on the top of the pile. We have a lot more to say and will say it in due time. We are not going to allow shareholders to be led blindly into another scheme that appears for all the world to be actuated by a substratum of selfishness on the part of the promoters.
