Flesherton.

The Presbyterian Toronto, contained the following interesting item last week from its Winnipeg correspondent respecting Rev. John Wells, a former pastor in Chalmers church here. Rev. John Wells, of Holland whom we mentioned recently as having resigned his charge and intending to take up his residence in Toronto, was given a royal send off by the citizens of Holland. From town and country they came, Presbyterian and otherwise filled the town hall to overflowing, read him a highly complimentary address and presented him with a fat purse of gold. Thus a ministry of eight years closes harmoniously, leaving happy memories.
