## DEATH OF WILLIAM JAMIESON.

The Father of Dr. Jamieson Passed Away Tuesday at the Age of Eighty-four Years.

Mr. W. M. Jamieson, father of Dr. Jamieson, of this town, died Tuesday last, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Martin, in Exeter. The deceased gentleman was born in Aberdeen, Scotland in 1822, and was therefore in his 84 year.
