THE DIPHTHERIA SCARE.

As very exaggerated reports are being circulated concerning the diphtheria outbreak in Markdale, we have taken the trouble to interview the Medical Health Officer, Dr. Ego, and ascertained definitely its extent. He states that the epidemic was of a mild form of the disease, there being some twelve or fifteen cases in all. Only three were severe in type-one death. The most of the cases were better before the family suspected what was wrong with the children, and from these mild unsuspected cases most of the contagion spread. There were in all seven homes placarded. The disease is now entirely under control-no new cases having developed for two weeks. The infected homes are still placarded and strictly quarantined by way of extra precaution-Staudard.

The other night a party of duck hunters were sitting in a down town hotel telling stories of famous shots and how many ducks and other birds had been killed at a single discharge. After listening for some time to what seemed a wilful exaggeration by different narrators a man who was present volunteered his first and only experience of the fatal double barrelled gun. He began: "I went into a field one day to try shootin'. The only game discovered was an immense flock of blackbirds. I should say there were 10,000 in the flock. Yes, quite 10,000. Slowly I crawled up to them, and when not more than thirty yards away the birds rose in a solid mass. I fired both barrels, and how many do you think I killed?" Different guesses were made ranging from twenty to one hundred birds. "Not one," said the stranger, "but I went out with my brother to look for results and we picked up thirty bushels of legs. I had shot a little too low." That was the last story told that night.

DEATH OF JAMES MURRAY.

A big souled, large-hearted, genial old Irishman has gone to his long home with the passing of James Murray of the township of Normanby, and the world is poorer by his going for men of his open heartedness and kindness are none too common. Many an old timer throughout the township of Normanby and elsewhere will speak kindly of the memory of "Jim" Murray, for he had been a well known character in his day. But the best of good fellows, and even Irishmen, must die, and 81 years, 4 months and 12 days is a good old age. The end came on Sunday last at the home of his son Mr. J. E. Murray with whom he was spending his declining days. Death was the result of hemorrhage of the brain, with paralysis of the tongue and throat. Deceased was born in the County of Armagh, Ireland, in the year 1824. He emigrated to America in 1830 via New York and came up to Normanby in 1835. In 1856 he journeyed to the Southern States, remaining there until 1860, when he married an Indiana girl, and the young couple then came back to the township of Normanby to hew out a home and clear a farm like many another plucky young couple had done before them and since. Their life had been the ups and downs, failures and successes to pioneering, and it was bravely and joyously lived as only those good folks knew how. Our pioneers are fast passing away and soon the older generation will all be gone. Then in the cold winter evenings around the cheery fire the children and children's children of these old heroes of the past will recount the stories of the "good old days," how their fathers and grandfathers opened up this country and laid the foundation for the present prosperous, virile young Canada of ours. The funeral took place yesterday forenoon to St. Peter's church and cemetery, and many attended to pay their respects and show their esteem for the late well loved old gentleman.—Hanover Post.
