Some Cement Pointers

TO THE EDITOR, DURHAM CHRONICLE.

DEAR SIR—I was highly pleased with your editorials and with Mr. Cochrane's opening letter on the cement trouble. I had intended for some time back to write suggesting that an investigation be called for to show good reason why we are not receiving any dividend. We receive so little information through the press or from any other source even that deputation that put on its spectacles and went down some time ago came home as it went leaving us still in the dark. We had rumors upon rumors about watered stock, etc., about 250 thousand of such stock 200 of which Cowham the Great kept for himself dividing the 50 between four associates to help carry out the plan. And again there was a rumor of enormous salaries that had to be paid to certain expert men who would not work any less and at which the shareholders kicked, but the project was so imposing and the profits promised to be so great that the old saying "Never venture never win" carried the day and the work went on. But this was all rumor a particle of which never appeared in print, or if it did I must have missed my glasses. Again there was a rumor of a nefarious coal deal, the buying up of an enormous quantity far more than necessary and at a famine price, the buyer and the seller going snooks over the surplus. This coal business so fertile in its illicit tendencies. Now, Mr. Editor, this resolution of the directors to move the immense plant to the rocky shores of the great river, is the best thing that ever happened. It has brought the sluggish shareholders and Editors of Durham to their feet—the slumbering giant has been aroused.—But to give credit to whom credit is due, I must say that these directors are men of nerve, or men of doubtful integrity. If they meant to depreciate the value of the stock they shot beside the mark or did not see it at all and if they really meant to move the plant it was an immense blunderbus. Now, Sir, leaving rumor aside, I would beg to make a suggestion or two to a venture, which, if found not to be of any use will at least, I think, be harmless. One is for the Cement Committee with the Doctor to knock at the Court of Kings Bench for a writ of Mandamus to stay the motion of that moving plant until the accounts of the Company and the actions of the directors be thoroughly examined that we may see why we have debts and not dividends. The other suggestion is to ask the Government to send down an expert auditor with powers to make the foregoing investigation from the beginning to the present time. Surely the Government will not refuse. Has not Sir Wilfrid the same authority in Canada to stay proceedings or suspend the powers of men or corporations as Gladstone had in Ireland when he suspended the collection of rents by the landlords until certain matters were adjusted. If wrong is doing now at the present time why not stop it if possible by a writ of mandamus and if wrong has been done and doing up to the present why not have an investigation as authoritative and thorough and put the saddle on the right horse. I would have written this letter some time ago but on account of my sluggishness.
