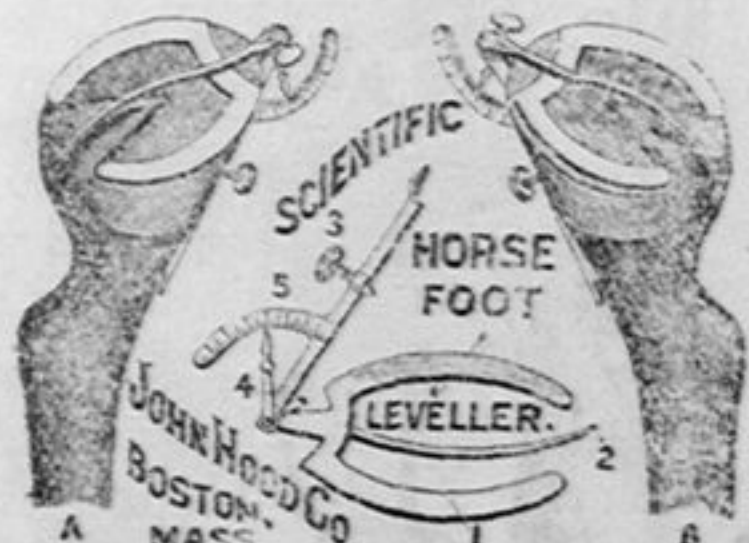

COUNTY COUNCIL.

With the exception of Mr. George A. Brown, of Meaford, who is very ill, there was a full attendance of the members at the opening session of the Grey county council on Tuesday.

Mr. A. C. Paterson withdrew his name from the list and after short addresses had been delivered by the movers and seconders in behalf of their respective candidates, the vote was taken.

On motion of Messrs. Allan and Pringle a special committee consisting of Messrs. J. W. Frost, Pringle, Paterson, Shute, Bell, Preston, Ball, Schenk and Allan, were appointed to draft the standing committees for the current year.

The clerk presented a large number of documents and accounts which were referred to their respective committees. Among these was a largely signed petition from the ratepayers of the police village of Shallow Lake asking the council to raise the village to the state of an incorporated village.

The Ontario Municipal Association sent a draft of a memorial which they propose forwarding to the Ontario Legislature asking them to repeal section 606 of the Municipal Act and requesting the council to endorse the same.

A petition from Durham asking that a free pedlar's license be granted to Hugh McKay.

Statements were received from the Owen Sound and Collingwood collegiate institutes and Meaford high school for maintenance.

Messrs George Binnie, A. F. Armstrong and Malcolm McPhee applied to be appointed as auditors.

Mr. James S. Wright, of Mount Forest, wrote regarding his claim for damages to his horse and rig at Egerton bridge.

Mr. C. Ramage, secretary of the Durham public school board, made a request for extra maintenance.

Mr. W. A. Bishop, clerk of the county and surrogate court, made a request for increased vault accommodation.

A copy of the judgment of Chief Justice Falconbridge in the case of the County of Grey against the village of Markdale was forwarded by Messrs. MacKay, Sampson & Teiford.

WEDNESDAY.

The Meaford Poultry Association applied for a grant of \$50 towards aiding their association.

Mr. W. D. Mills, of Durham, asked to be appointed as auditor.

The report of the special committee appointed to draft the standing committees submitted their report when after a slight amendment was adopted as follows:

Roads and Bridges—Messrs. Pringle, McColman, Bell, Brown, McCannell, Shute, Schenk and K. L. Frost, or Shute chairman.

Education—Messrs. Ball, Shute, McColman, Bell, Pringle, Brown, Allan and J. W. Frost. Mr. Bell, chairman.

Printing—Messrs. Paterson, Schenk, Westaway, Shute, Bell, Preston, K. L. Frost and McCannell. Mr. McCannell, chairman.

Communications and Memorials—Messrs. J. W. Frost, Westaway, Brown, Ball, Bell, Allan, Shute and McColman. Mr. McColman, chairman.

House of Refuge—The Warden and Messrs. Preston and Schute. Mr. Preston, chairman.

Warden's Committee—Messrs. Allan, Pringle and McArthur.

At the evening session the reports of Messrs. H. H. Burgess and Samuel Huff, public school inspectors, were read and referred to the educational committee.

The clerk presented a number of accounts which were also referred to the various committees.

A request for an increase of salary was received from the clerk and read by the warden and referred to the finance committee.

On motion of Messrs. Paterson and Preston a resolution of sympathy was passed expressing the deep sorrow and regret of the council at the great physical suffering their esteemed colleague, Mr. G. A. Brown, representative of division No. 7, was called on to endure and hoping that in the providence of God he might be speedily restored to his wonted health.

The clerk was instructed to transmit a copy of the resolution to Mr. Brown.

As the Thursday evening session in addition to the numerous reports and accounts received and referred to the various committees Mr. Thomas Harness presented a report from the house of refuge up to the end of 1905 and in addition make application for an increase in salary.

Reports were received from the finance, county and property and education committee also from the special committee on the Orchard bridge.

FRIDAY MORNING

The clerk read a letter from the warden notifying the council of a damaged bridge on the townline of Sydenham and St. Vincent.

Mr. James McLaughlan appealed to the council for a liberal grant towards the general aid marine hospital.

The county treasurer was instructed to pay to the various school sections in the county entitled to receive it, an amount equal to the government grant for continuation classes.

The road and bridge committee were instructed to take steps to prevent an accident at the bridge on the townline between Glenelg and Artemesia, half a mile north of Priceville, the bridge having been reported in a dangerous condition, and also to have the necessary repairs made at once.

The report of the road and bridge committee relative to the accident at Orchardville bridge was adopted on the following division: Yeas—Messrs Allan, Ball, Bell, McCannell, Preston, McArthur, Schenk, Shute and Warden Thompson; Nays—Messrs. J. W. Frost, Robert Frost, McColman, Paterson, Pringle and Westaway.

FRIDAY EVENING

The evening session was taken up principally with the reception and discussion of reports from the different committees. Bylaws for the appointment of Messrs. A. F. Armstrong and George Binnie as auditors; R. R. McKinnis as trustee for Owen Sound collegiate institute and Messrs. James Cochrane and James Allan as members of the judicial board of audit were introduced and given the required readings.

A bylaw was also passed guaranteeing certain debentures of the village of Chatsworth.

The clerk was instructed to lay on the table at the June session a copy of the agreement and bylaw between the Toronto Grey and Bruce Railway Company and the County of Grey.

SATURDAY MORNING.

A bylaw was passed for the appointment of Thomas McCerrill as a trustee for the Meaford high school.

A committee of three, of whom the warden is a member, was appointed to examine the bridge at Cedarville with a view to having a new one built and report at the June session.

The messenger boy was granted \$5 for his services during the session and the caretaker \$1 per day.

A motion by Messrs. Allan and Bell that the next session of the council be held at Dandak was lost and a similar motion by Messrs. Allan and Schenk that the council meet at Meaford was carried on the casting vote of the warden.

A vote of thanks was tendered to the Owen Sound council for the use of the council chamber.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.

A very sad accident, and one that terminated fatally, happened on the Thursday before New Year's to Mr. John Coupland, a member of the Turnberry township council. On the afternoon referred to, Mr. Coupland and his son, Percy, went out to the woods to cut wood. Towards evening, a tree they had felled lodged in another tree, and a large limb that broke off the falling tree was hurled back. Mr. Coupland saw the limb coming and endeavored to reach a place of safety. The limb, however, struck him, it is supposed, on the back. His son at once ran to his assistance and lifted the limb, which was lying across his father's legs, and propping him against a tree, hurried home for a horse and cutter. Mr. Coupland complained of his back, and as quickly as possible a messenger was despatched to Wingham for a physician. A little later, probably less than an hour after the accident occurred and before the doctor arrived the injured man expired. Mr. Coupland was well respected, and is highly spoken of by his neighbors as an industrious, upright man and a kind neighbor. He leaves a widow and two sons, who keenly feel the trial that has deprived them of the head of the home. Mr. Coupland had lived for many years in the township; the long service he had given in Turnberry council and his frequent re-election were evidence that he enjoyed the confidence and esteem of his fellow electors. Sincere sympathy is felt for the family so sadly and suddenly bereft. We are informed that only two months ago the deceased terminated his connection with the A. O. U. W. A memorial service was held in Belmore Methodist church, being conducted by Rev. J. H. Osterhout. Mr. Coupland was a valued member of Belmore Methodist church, and of the quarterly official board. He was of a genial disposition, sympathetic in his nature, and of sterling principles.

Mrs. Johnston was only 35 years of age, and was housekeeping for James Moses, south side. The funeral on Wednesday was largely attended, and was under the direction of the C. O. C.
