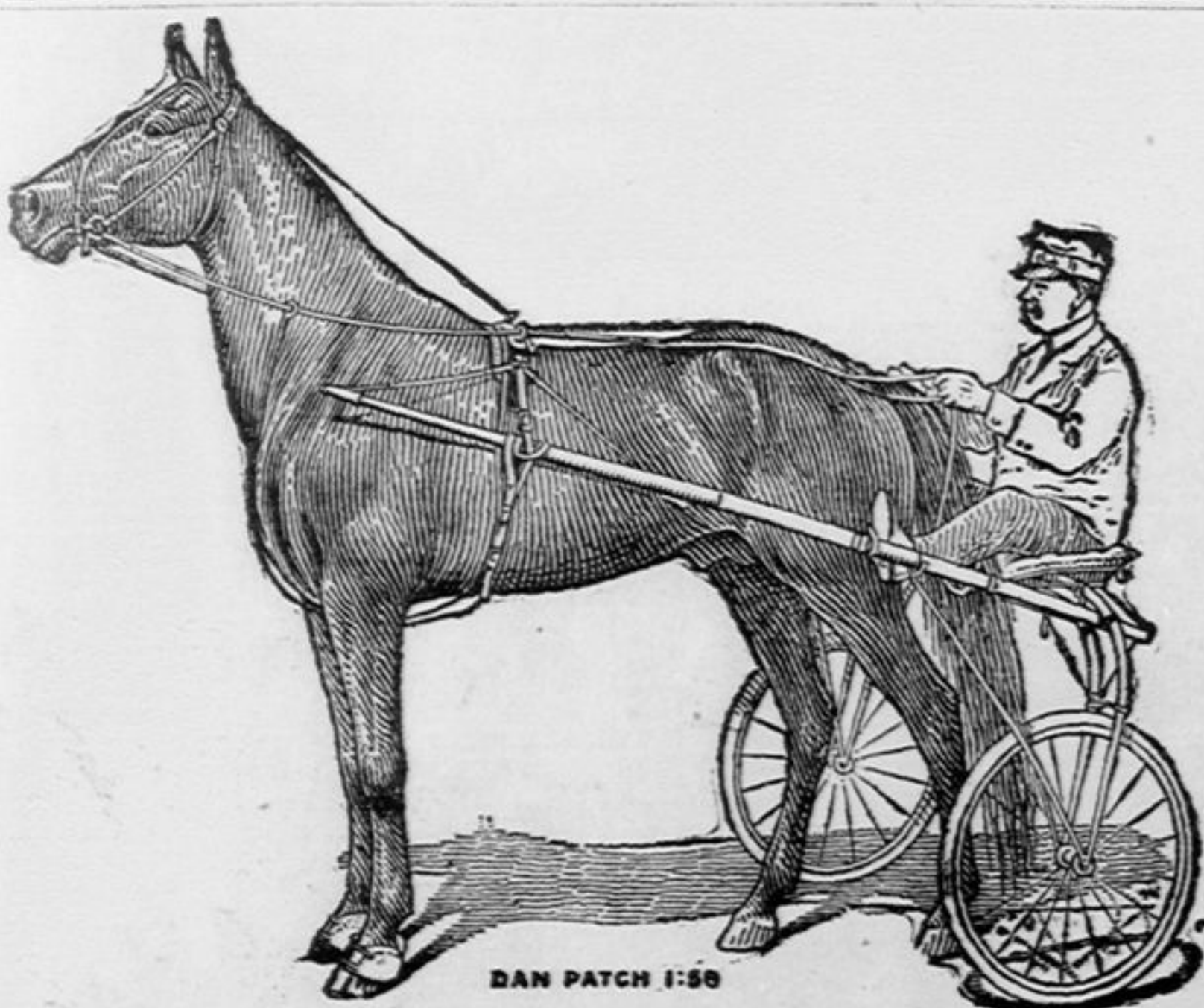

### Flatz and Health.

The superiority of London over Paris in the matter of health, and especially in the matter of tubercular diseases, is due principally to the fact that there are fewer flats in the English metropolis than in the French. The excessive elevation of buildings designed to be let in flats prevents the sunlight from reaching the lower rooms, and so makes these the breeding places of every form of disease.—Paris Journal.

### Bonbon Baskets.

Baskets of drawn sugar make an exceedingly dainty ornament, with flaring edges and a long handle. They are woven from strands of variegated color or they are entirely of satiny white strands, with perhaps a ribbon of pink or blue sugar fastened at the top. These baskets are employed to hold bonbons or petit fours, no other receptacles appearing on the table. A hostess tells the caterer the color scheme for her dining room, and he furnishes the sugar decorations in accordance.

### Scratched Furniture.

It is asserted that light scratches or marks on polished tables or chairs can be effaced by rubbing the meat of the common black walnut over them. After the oil of the nut has been rubbed in it is hardly possible to find the scratch. If the furniture is black walnut this would seem on the homeopathic principle of "similia similibus curantur."

### Heliotrope Sachet.

Heliotrope sachet is one of the best that is made, and it imparts a delicious fragrance to clothing. Make it thus: Mix well together and pass through a coarse sieve half a pound oforris root, a quarter of a pound of ground rose leaves, two ounces of powdered tonquin beans, half a grain of musk and two drops of essence of almonds.

### Carpet Sweeping.

In sweeping a carpet make long, even strokes with the broom, not little jerky dabs, which are hard on the carpet and the wielder of the broom as well. Don't sweep from one side to another, but from the edges toward the middle, and don't forget to raise the windows so that the dust will blow out if it can be managed.

### To Save Stockings.

To save the wear of stockings, take a new piece of wash leather and gum it inside the heels of shoes. This will, by preventing friction, save the heels of stockings immensely. Mothers of boys and girls should take advantage of this hint, for it will spare them many stitches.
