A. O. U. W.

The Grand Lodge Ancient Order of United Workmen of Ontario, which holds its twenty-eighth annual meeting in Toronto on the 21st of March next in the I. O. F. Temple building, shows a very excellent record for the year 1905. After providing for all deaths reported up to December 31st, 1905, there remained in the Beneficiary Fund a balance of \$142,000; \$100,000 of the amount was transferred to reserve, making the reserve fund \$614,000 at the end of the year. At the end of January this fund was increased to the extent of \$617,000, and the balance in the beneficiary fund to \$70,000, showing a surplus over all claims of \$687,000. The session is not likely to be a protracted one, as the only important matters to come before the body are those of biennial sessions and reduced representation. The Order in Ontario is purely independent and Canadian; has nothing whatever to do with the United States, having severed its connection with the Supreme Lodge in 1897. Since its inception in Ontario in 1877 it has paid out to the beneficiaries of its deceased members between ten and eleven millions of dollars. The Order has a record second to none in this country.

Caretaker of Church in Elgin Baby Burned as a Result.

St. Thomas, Ont., Feb. 28.—The acetylene gas machine used for lighting the Springfield Methodist Church exploded last night and is now a complete wreck. For purposes of safety it had been placed in the shed over a year ago. The caretaker had lighted up for choir practice, and as it was not working well he went to investigate, when it exploded with a report that shook buildings at the far end of the village. The shed took fire, and it was with difficulty it was extinguished.

The caretaker, J. Atkinson, was badly burned about the arms and head. The back windows of the church were smashed.
