### DEATH OF MRS. SCOTT.

Long Time Resident of Rockford Passes Suddenly Away.

(Kamloops Inland Sentinel.)

Almost without warning death claimed Mary Ann Scott, wife of Robert Scott, of Rockford, on Tuesday evening, the cause of death being a paralytic stroke.

Twice before had the deceased lady who was of the advanced age of 74 years, been similarly seized but she had recovered from the attacks and latterly her health had been good. Then came the unexpected third attack late on Tuesday afternoon, death resulting a few hours later.

The deceased, who was a native of Ireland, coming with her parents to Durham, Ont., when a few months old, was highly respected and esteemed by a host of friends throughout the Interior, more particularly in Nicola and Kamloops where she was better known. An estimable wife and mother, those who are left to mourn her best know how great is the loss. Mr. and Mrs. Scott came to this Province in 1876 and have since resided on their ranch at Rockford and by their industry and kindness of heart succeeded in making a comfortable competence and a host of friends. Of thirteen children, the fruit of the union, nine are living, three of whom, Mrs. Morrison, Mrs. W. Hume and J. A. Scott, reside in Kamloops, the others being Mrs. Jas. Aird, Millerville, Alta.; S. J. P. Scott, Rockford; B. B. Scott, Boise, Idaho; Mrs. J. S. Driscoll, Salt Lake City; R. J. Scott, Winnipeg, W. A. Scott, V. S., Edmonton; these, her husband and two remaining brothers, B. Moore, of Mount Tolmie, Victoria, and Jos. Moore, of this city, mourn her loss keenly. A short service was held at Rockford this morning at 10 o'clock, the Rev. J. P. of Nicola, officiating.

The funeral will take place in this city on Sunday afternoon, the service being held in the Methodist Church at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. The pall bearers will be James Aird, J. Friesken, Jos. Guichon, F. W. Jackson, Wm. and J. McLeod.
