GENERAL NEWS.

The "Allan Line" Steamship Co. has ordered a new steamer to take the place of the Bavarian, recently wrecked.

Rioting was general throughout Paris on May 1. Troops were stationed all through the city and over a hundred arrests made.

The General Postoffice at Toronto is to be made fireproof, when rebuilt. As the pneumatic system of distributing from the Union Station is about to be installed, the Adelaide office will be the administration office, and sorting will be done at the Union.

A row occurred in Havana, Cuba, on Tuesday over the refusal by some Cuban police to lower the Spanish flag. One was shot and several arrested.

Wales is off again on a religious revival, and people are gathering from far and near.

The stone cutters at Ottawa went out May 1 over a disagreement amongst themselves. They can't tell who should trim the shoddy, and the contractor says they'll have to settle that themselves.

Troops fired on striking miners at Mt. Carmel, Pa., and one will probably die. Several were injured.

A despatch from Naples states that King Edward and Queen Alexandra viewed the crater of Mt. Vesuvius before starting for England.

Hiram Walker & Sons, distillers, had a man smothered in one of their malt bins a couple of weeks ago. He left a widow and eleven children. The deceased's widow is to receive his salary until the youngest child is 21 years of age, free house rent for 20 years, and all her eleven children will be given employment as soon as fitted for it.

Local Option in Owen Sound was preceded by a grand blow-out the night before and though the whisky flowed freely we understand that no arrests had to be made.

The directors of the Hamilton Steel and Iron Company met last week and decided to erect a second blast furnace with a capacity of 400 tons a day. It is to go up at Hamilton, or a point on Lake Erie.

Edith Latta, a 15-year old Belleville girl, has been asleep for four weeks.

James McMahon was killed by a K. and P. train while crossing the track at Renfrew. It was a level crossing.

Twenty thousand longshoremen are out on strike on the Great Lakes.

Mrs. Henry Allan, of Landsdowne, near Brockville, has been arrested, charged with poisoning her husband. A man named O'Connor was also taken into custody as a accomplice.

Ten thousand iron workers are out on strike at Buffalo, Depew, Tonawanda, Lookport and Niagara Falls.

Geo. Garton, a farmer living near Wingham, suicided last week by hanging. He was sixty years of age.

The Nester Lumber Co., Detroit, with works at Ashland, Wis., have decided to move their mills to the Georgian Bay district, where they have purchased one hundred and fifty million feet of timber.

Morris Doherty, the 4-year-old son of a Meaford farmer, fell off a loaded wagon on which he was riding under the front wheels, which passed over him with fatal results. He lingered about twelve hours.

The remains of a six-weeks-old child were discovered by some boys in High Park, Toronto. An inquest is to be held.

A grave, for which can be found no record, has been discovered in the Presbyterian church cemetery at Avonbank, six miles from St. Marys, and an investigation will be held.

The tug Clipper sprang a leak in Georgian Bay, on Monday of last week, and sank, three of a crew of four going down with her.
