LEGISLATURE PROLOGUED.

The most Radical Legislation ever placed on Provincial Statute Book in one Session.

Looking back upon the busy session of the Legislature just closed—the business in many moons—the general public verdict will be that the Whitney Government has made good.

It is well to call it the Whitney Government. The Premier's personality has dominated every department of it, the session through. He has insisted on handling and controlling the reins, coaching the backward members of Cabinet, restraining those who chafed to dash forward.

A WEAK OPPOSITION.

The Government has been favored by fortunate circumstances. It has proved itself strong, but its strength is magnified in the public eye by the weakness of its opponents. The condition of the Liberal Opposition has been sadly unsatisfactory.

But, apart from the onus of the past, the session would suggest that the parties should soon swap names. The Whitney Government has proved itself nothing if not progressive, liberal and advanced. Its legislation has been the most radical ever placed upon the Provincial statute book in one session.
