The new G. T. R. station was
opened for public use Wednesday of
last week and the finishing touches
were given the yard, platform, sid-
ing, etc., the past week, until now
the premises are as neat and attrac-
tive as the most fastidious could de-
sire. The broad lawn extending
from the station to Queen St. was
sodded with rolls of sod from the
Co.'s fields at Palmerston, and a nice
green sward is the result. The in-
terior of the station is as attractive
as the exterior, the furnishings con-
sisting of the latest designed central
and side seats in the main waiting
room and in the separate ladies' and
gents' rooms. The seats and ceiling
are of natural wood, the operator's
and ticket office of dark oak with
glass panels; the wainscoting is also
of dark oak, the remainder of the
walls to the ceiling being finished in
dark blue and gold smeltz. The
heating, when required, will be by
steam from radiators set in alcoves
in the wall while tasty electroliers
